### COMMENT ON VARIOUS MATTERS

**Roads of Robeson as Compared With Other Roads—Right Stand on Dogs and Kid Car-Drivers—Some Bennettsville People—The Ladies of Bennettsville "Do Dress."**

To the Editor of The Robesonian: Now that the greatest political campaign in the history of Robeson county has been ended with great satisfaction to a large majority of its people, I want to say just a few words regarding the roads. The good or bad roads bull-throwes, whichever you prefer to call them, should go over some of the much-praised roads in the small counties, and rest for themselves. During the past several months I have traveled over the public roads in Robeson, Scotland and Richmond counties in North Carolina, and Marlboro and Dillon counties in South Carolina. I do not think there has been over two weeks at any time since the first of November that I have not been over these roads, some of them often, others not so often, and I don't believe any of these counties has better roads than Robeson. The worst road I have been over recently, is the one from Bennettsville to Hamlet, Marlboro and Richmond counties. Last Saturday night I drove from Bennettsville to Lumberton via Laurinburg, and when we hit the Scotland line the driver said "Now look out for some rough riding." The road from Maxton to Lumberton was as good as anyone could wish, but it has a bridge that is going to cost the county some money if it is not repaired. I refer to the bridge at Harper's Ferry. It is a "death hop." The real truth is, Robeson roads will average better than any I travel over.

I am certainly glad to see that Lumberton authorities have taken the stand they have on dogs and kid car-drivers. Does anyone in Lumberton remember the agonies they saw a man suffering there one night about three years ago as the result of being bitten by a dog a short time before, then? He died two or three days later in Bladen jail.

It was my pleasure a few days ago to meet Mr. Claud Chaffin, treasurer of Marlboro county. Mr. Chaffin is a brother of Mr. Robert Chaffin, of Lumberton. He is a son of the late Rev. W. S. Chaffin, for many years greatly loved member of the North Carolina conference. Mr. Claud Chaffin was born in Lumberton in 1868, at which time his father was pastor of the Lumberton church. Mr. Chaffin has been a resident of Bennettsville over 50 years, and is very popular.

In Bennettsville I find Mr. James Howell, a native of Whiteville, who in times gone by was a frequent Lumberton visitor. After the death of Mr. Howell's mother his father, the late Mr. Mills Howell, married Mrs. Francis Barker, of Robeson county. She was the mother of Mr. J. A. Barker of Lumberton.

One of the leading ladies ready to wear houses here is conducted by Mr. L. C. McArthur, a native Robesonian, a brother of Mesdames Robert Lewis and W. P. McAllister, of Lumberton.

I was glad to meet on the street here today Mrs. Daisy Jenkins of Lumberton. She is visiting her mother and other relatives in this section.

One of my next door neighbors is Mr. Herbert Griffin, a brother of Mr. J. W. Griffin, of Lumberton, while on the same block is my old Lumberton friend Col. H. B. Fuller. What the colonel doesn't know about a horse is not worth knowing.

Mr. J. H. Mitchell, a native of the Fairmont section, is a resident of Bennettsville, where he and his most excellent family are very popular. Forty years ago Mr. Mitchell was a salesman for Pope & McLeod, at that time one of the leading firms in Lumberton. (Wish you could see some of the advertisements Mr. McLeod used to write for the Robesonian where he referred to himself as "Old Alex.")

If any one doubts my statement they can come and see for themselves I declare Bennettsville is the most "dressed up" town I have ever spent any time in. There are several ladies ready-to-wear stores here, where quantity and quality can be seen. When the "American Beauties" turn out here in the late afternoon every conceivable color of beauty may be seen in great profusion, but those who are looking for "moving pictures" on the streets will be disappointed. The ladies of Bennettsville do dress.
