LANDSLIDE SWEEPS HARDING AND COOLIDGE INTO OFFICE

ELECTION OF REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT CONCEDED BY CHAIRMAN WHITE.

CAM MORRISON ELECTED GOV. BY OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

DEMOCRATS CARRY EVERY CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT IN NORTH CAROLINA

Early last night the New York World, a Democratic newspaper, conceded the election of Senator Harding, Republican candidate for President. About midnight Gov. Cox's Dayton News conceded the election of Harding, and Chairman White of the Democratic National committee, wired congratulations to Senator Harding, Gov. Coolidge, Vice Presidential candidate, and Chairman Hayes of the Republican National committee.

North Carolina seems to have rolled up the largest Democratic majority in years. Cameron Morrison was elected Governor by a majority of around 60,000, and every district elected a Democratic Congressman.

ROBESON COUNTY GIVES ABOUT 1,350 MAJORITY FOR DEMOCRATIC TICKET

DESPITE BITTER FACTIONAL FIGHT COUNTY ROLLS UP GOOD MAJORITY FOR DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES.

Varser For Senate, McArthur and Jenkins For House and Balance of County Ticket Elected

Despite a bitter factional fight which led many former Democrats to scratch the county ticket, Robeson county rolled up handsome majority for the Democratic nominees. L. R. Varser of Lumberton was elected to the Senate by a majority estimated at around 1,350 over his Republican opponent, notwithstanding the fact that St. Pauls, Maxton and Rowland, former Democratic strongholds, gave a large vote to the Republican candidate.

The vote for State Senator was the supreme test. With 24 of the 25 townships of the county heard from, vote from Maxton and Gaddy being merely estimated, the vote of L. R. Varser of Lumberton, Democrat, was 4,598, a majority of about 1,350 over J. C. Snoddy of Red Springs, Republican, whose vote was approximately 3,237. That gives Varser a majority without the vote of his home township, Lumberton.

The balance of the county Democratic ticket was elected by a greater majority, the principal scratching being on the candidate for Senate.

New York, Nov. 2, 12:12 a. m.—Chairman White tonight sent congratulatory message to Harding, Coolidge and Hayes.

Dayton, O., Nov. 2, 12:07 A. M.—Cox said he would make no statement tonight concerning election.

New York, 12:07—The Times, Democratic newspaper, conceded Harding's election at eleven five tonight.

Boston, 12:07 a. m.—Harding has carried Boston, one of the strongest Democratic fortresses in the country, by thirty thousand.

New York, 11:34 p. m.—Republican leaders claimed victory in Colorado, where Democrats conceded margin eight thousand votes in Denver and election of S. D. Nicholson, Republican, to Senate. Claimed for Harding Wisconsin, Michigan, Oregon, Washington. Bitter battle in progress in Missouri and Indiana.

Raleigh, 11:34—Indications at ten o'clock were that Democrats carried all congressional districts in North Carolina.

Raleigh, Nov. 2, 11:24—Additional estimates of Democratic majorities follows: Mecklenburg 7000, Rowan 1800, Bertie 1887, Craven, 1190, Wake 4000, Hoke 1300, Rockingham 750, Guilford 863. The amendments carried 8 to 1 in Hertford county.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 2, 11:38—Early returns from middle and western Tennessee indicate Cox will have usual Democratic majority given President, while Gov. Roberts, Democratic, leading. Taylor slightly reduced majority. Blount county first eastern Tennessee reported 5,000 majority for Taylor, Republican, for Governor.

New York, Nov. 2, 11:30—Twenty two hundred and forty-six districts out of 4875 outside New York city gave Cox 265,000, Harding 599,085.

New York, Nov. 2, 10:25—New York Times estimates that Harding will carry New York State by 700,000.

Salisbury—Rowan county gives Democratic ticket majority of 1800 out of 7000 counted.

New York, Nov. 2, 10:35, p. m.—New York Tribune says President's home district, Trenton, N. Y., went for Harding.

White Builds Hope on Western States.
New York, Nov. 2, 10:54 p. m.—"We have every reason to believe Cox will be elected by States beyond Alleghenias," Chairman White said at 8:45.

Columbus, O., Nov. 2, 10:45 p. m.—State Republican headquarters claiming State by 300,000.

Cleveland, O., 10:54—Cleveland Press concedes Harding's election.

New York, Nov. 2, 10:54—Reports gathered by the United Press indicated at 9 o'clock that election of Harding is practically certain.

Majority for Amendments in a Number of Counties.

Raleigh, Nov. 2, 10:57—New Hanover reports majority for amendments. Cleveland county turned in 3000 majority for Morrison and ten per cent less than that for the amendments. A number of the other larger counties report that the amendments were carried by substantial majorities.

Every District Carried by Democrats—Amendments Apparently Have Good Chance.

Raleigh, Nov. 2, 9:48—Complete official returns from 10 counties so far reports give Morrison majority of 19000 votes. Indications lead Chairman Warren to believe Democrats will sweep State with largest majority ever accorded party. There is no longer doubt that Weaver has won out in the tenth district with a majority that will run over a thousand.

Every other congressional district has been carried by the Democrats.

Early returns on constitutional amendments convinces central committee in charge of campaign that

they have mighty good chance of carrying. In number of places they are running ahead of ticket, indicating that both Democrats and Republicans are voting for them. Johnston county gave 200 larger majority for amendments than it gave Democrats.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 2, 11:02 P. M.—Harding leading 10 to 1, first returns.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 2—Bryan announced that he voted straight Democratic ticket.

Atlanta, Nov. 2—Republican carried Polk and Whitfield counties, indicated.

New York, Nov. 2, 11:02—Republican State Chairman Hammon wired Harding carried Oklahoma by 15,000.

Atlanta, Nov. 2, 11:02—Mrs. Overton McDaniel, first woman elected to office in Georgia, succeeded husband as collector Columbus county, against several men.

Newark, N. J., Nov. 2, 11:10 p. m.—Indications are Harding will carry New Jersey by 150,000. Ten Republican and 2 Democratic Congressmen appear to be elected.

New York, Nov. 2—According to early returns, Harding apparently carried New York, Vermont and Massachusetts. Cox apparently carried all solid South. Returns indicate usual majority.
