Work Suspended On 14 Capital Ships RED PEPPER FOR

Step Taken in Anticipation of Ratification of Naval Limitation Treaty -Great Saving Will be Made.

Construction work on 14 capital ships was suspended Feb. 8 by order of Secretary Denby under the direc-tion of President Harding. The step was taken in anticipation of ratification of the naval limitation treaty which resulted from the Washington conference and under which only three of the vessels involved will be completed as war craft. The other 11 will be scrapped or converted to merchant ships under the treaty provisions, states an Associated Press dispatch.

Secretary Denby acted after Assist ant Secretary Roosevelt had discussed with President Harding the terms of get the genuine, with the name Rowles the treaty affecting the new ships. In round figures, the building operations thus halted have cost the governapproximately \$5,000,000 ment month.

Following ratification of the treaty, contracts for the new ships will be cancelled.

The ultimate cost to the government of the cancellation cannot be determined in advance but naval officials believe that a considerable saving will be made through the action.






