MANY LOST LIVES IN CYCLONIC THUNDERSTORM IN NEW YORK

Death Toll More Than 8 Score Men Women and Children—Occupants of Boats Engulfed by Blinding Storm of Wind and Hail.

At least 250 canoes, row boats and small motorboats were bobbing about off the island, witnesses said, when the storm came screaming down on the resort at a velocity of 80 miles and hour, or better. Occupants of the DAUGHTREY IS little craft, sensing their danger, made a run for shelter, but scarcely had they got under way when they were engulfed in a blinding storm of rain and hail.

As quickly as it had come, the storm vanished. It had lasted less than five minutes. But scarcely a dozen of the 250 small craft had survived. Horrormon theme: "The greatest of Life's stricken, but helpless to aid, the Forces." casino pier saw scores of men and women clinging to wrecked and overturned craft in the choppy sound and bay. One by one, they gave up the struggle, and dropped quietly off to

be carried out toward the open sea by the tide.

Some of the bodies, the police say, probably never will be recovered. The tide, turning, brought more than a score of them back today. Eye-witnesses estimated there were between 500 and 750 prsons in the wrecked craft. Heroic work by the United States life guards, members of near-by beach clubs and volunteers from the shore crowds saved hundreds.
