Sydney, N. S.—Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, died at 2 o'clock a. m., Aug. 2nd at Beinn Bhreagh, his estate near Baddeck. Although the inventor had been in failing health for several months he had not been confined to bed and the end was unexpected. Late yesterday afternoon, however, his condition became serious and Dr. Ker, of Washington, a cousin of Mrs. Bell, a house guest, and a Sydney physician, attended him. With Mr. Bell when he died were Mrs. Bell, a daughter, Mrs. Marian Hubbard Fairchild, and her husband, David G. Fairchild, of Washington. The inventor leaves another daughter, Mrs. Elsie M. Grovesnor, wife of a Washington magazine editor.

NEGRO FARMERS' CONGRESS

Cooperative Marketing and Other Vital Subjects Will be Discussed by Experts at Congress to be Held at Greensboro This Week. Greensboro, Aug. 3.—Negro farmers will gather in large numbers at A. & T. college, Greensboro, to hear experts on co-operative marketing and other farm subjects, at the negro farmers' congress August 8th and 9th. Co-operative marketing, fall and winter legumes, the family cow, productivity of the soil, rural economics and other agricultural subjects will be discussed by men who are authorities along these lines. Dr. B. W. Kilgore, director of the North Carolina States Relation Service, who has toured California and other states, will make the principle address on co-operative marketing. He is an authority on the subject. This is the greatest movement ever started among farmers. A farmer who is not a member of either of the associations must have not had the proper information. Such farmers should by all means attend the Greensboro meeting. Dr. C. S. Brown will deliver an address during the meeting. Mr. Fred R. Yoder of the A. & E. college will speak on rural improvement. Mr. A. C. Kimery of the State Department will speak on the value of the dairy cow. Prof. C. R. Hudson on how to make the soil more productive. There will be a budding demonstration at the Van-Lindley nursery; big barbecue dinner the second day. Don't miss President Inboden's annual address Tuesday morning, August 8th. Two great days.
