AN ORDINANCE At a special meeting of the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the town of Pembroke, North Carolina, held at the office of the Clerk and Treasurer of said town, at Pembroke, N. C., on the 1st day of September, 1922, at 8:00 o'clock p. m., the mayor and all members of the board being present, the following ordinance was unanimously adopted. Motion was made by J. L. Thagard, seconded by A. M. Breece and all members, viz: J. L. Thagard, A. B. Beasley, A. M. Breece and W. M. Lowry, voting in the affirmative and none in the negative.

Whereas the public health of the citizens of the town of Pembroke is being daily endangered on account of the need of said town for adequate drainage facilities, and travel over its streets and property easy, safe and comfortable in wet weather, and whereas the board of commissioners deem it imperatively necessary that an adequate system be installed in order to protect the health of its citizens and residents and to make passage over its streets and property easy, safe and comfortable, and that it is imperatively necessary that at least \$8500 be expended therefor and that the said town issue and sell its negotiable coupon bonds in the said sum of Eighty-Five Hundred Dollars for said purpose.

Therefore, under and pursuant to Chapter 106 Public Laws of North Carolina, Extra Session, 1921, be it resolved that the said Town of Pembroke by its Mayor and Board of Commissioners issue and sell its negotiable coupon bonds in the said sum of Sixty-Five Hundred Dollars, in detail as is hereinafter set forth: a. The purpose of said issue shall be to install an adequate system of drainage and sewerage for said town.

b. The maximum aggregate principal amount of said bonds shall be Sixty-Five Hundred Dollars, (\$6500.00), which shall be issued in series, the amount of each bond to be determined and authorized by an ordinance of the board, the last of said bonds to mature in thirty years, and to bear interest not to exceed six per cent. per annum payable semi-annually.

c. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds shall be annually levied and collected. d. That a statement of the Town of Pembroke has been filed with the Clerk and Treasurer and is open to public inspection at his office.

Raleigh City Detective Murdered by Whiskey-Crazed Boy.

City Detective Tom Crabtree died in a hospital in Raleigh Friday of wounds inflicted early Thursday morning by "Boots" Kluttz, 19-year-old white boy who was crazed by whiskey. After midnight Wednesday night Kluttz hired a car and forced the negro to continue the drive at the point of a pistol. When the negro got out and ran, calling for help, Detective Crabtree went to the car and immediately Kluttz began firing at him, firing three bullets into Crabtree's body and then driving the car over him. Kluttz is in the county jail in Raleigh. Crabtree was 36 years old. A benefit fund of \$5,000 is being raised for his widow and 4 children.

C., on the 1st day of September, 1922, at 8:00 o'clock p. m., the mayor and all members of the board being present, the following ordinance was unanimously adopted. Motion was made by J. L. Thagard, seconded by A. M. Breece and all members, viz: J. L. Thagard, A. B. Beasley, A. M. Breece and W. M. Lowry, voting in the affirmative and none in the negative. Whereas the town of Pembroke, North Carolina, prior to December 31st, 1921, incurred for necessary public improvements in the sum of Sixty-Five Hundred Dollars as is hereinafter set forth, and it appearing that it is imperatively necessary that the said indebtedness be paid and that the said town issue and sell its negotiable coupon bonds in the said sum of Sixty-Five Hundred Dollars for the refunding of said debt: Therefore, under and pursuant to Chapter 106 Public Laws of North Carolina, Extra Session, 1921, be it resolved that the said Town of Pembroke by its Mayor and Board of Commissioners issue and sell its negotiable coupon bonds in the said sum of Sixty-Five Hundred Dollars, in detail as is hereinafter set forth: a.
