Report of Bombardment of American Destroyer by Turks Unconfirmed.

London, Oct. 4. (Associated Press.)—Reuters has received the following from a semi-official source in Athens: "According to the newspapers, an American destroyer engaged in embarking refugees at Avlivi was bombed by the Turks." (Avlivi is on the Asia Minor coast north of Smyrna, opposite Mytilene).

Baltimore Negro Cafe Destroyed by Fire.

The Baltimore cafe, owned and operated by Mary Love McMillan, colored, about 1 mile from Lumberton on the Fairmont road, was destroyed by fire about 2:30 Tuesday morning.

Conciliation Marks Conference Between Allies and Turks.

Constantinople, Oct. 4. (Associated Press.)—The Mudania conference, it is understood this evening, will probably reach an agreement on all points of the Turkish proposals upon which M. Franklin-Bouillon secured Kemal Pasha's pledge to suspend military movements during the negotiations with the exception of the provision relating to the occupation of the western line of the Maritza river by allied troops.

17,126 BALES COTTON GINNED.

Washington, Oct. 3.—A reduction of 440,000 bales during September, in prospective cotton production this year, was shown in the department of agriculture's forecast issued today placing the crop at 10,135,000 equivalent 500-pound bales.
