BODIES OF VICTIMS OF WHITE-ROBED AND MASKED MEN RECOVERED FROM LAKE

A Former Deputy Arrested—Aftermath of Kidnaping, Flogging and Murder Stunt

Bastrop, La., Dec. 23.—A former Morehouse Parish deputy, T. J. Burnett, of Spyster, La., was arrested late today by the order of Attorney General A. V. Coco and placed in the Parish jail here charged with murder in connection with the death of two men who the authorities charge were the victims of white robed and masked men who kidnaped five on the Bastrop-Mer Rouge road last August. Those arrested will face the open hearings ordered today by the Attorney General to begin in the Parish court house on January 5, under guard of State troops. An inquest was conducted behind closed doors at Mer Rouge this afternoon over the bodies cast up by Lake La Fourche yesterday after unidentified dynamiters had made an effort to remove them from their watery grave of four months. The findings at the inquest were not announced. Officials declared they were satisfied with the identification of the bodies as those of Daniels and Richards. The bodies were viewed by dozens of relatives and friends during the day. New Orleans pathologists conducted an autopsy to determine how the men came to their death. They declared the examination revealed that the men had been flogged and some bones broken before they died. They refused to reply to the question whether the men were killed before being bound and thrown into the lake, or whether they were thrown into the lake alive and died of strangulation. That the autopsy was considered of most vital importance in the prosecution of those who will be charged with the murder was indicated by the Attorney General, who declared that "every scar and mark counts."

Department of Justice investigators have frequently declared they had a list of the names of those connected with the kidnaping tragedy. Governor Parker has indicated hooded men of Mississippi and Arkansas as well as Louisiana were implicated. Department of Justice agents and State officials have during the past four months under the personal direction of Governor Parker, prepared a chain of circumstantial evidence outlining events preceding the kidnaping as well as the movements of the mob on the fatal night which will be the basis of the prosecution it has been reported. Trouble started in Morehouse last summer, when an alleged attempt was made to assassinate Dr. B. M. McKoin, former mayor of Mer Rouge. Dr. McKoin, in discussing the incident, declared he was summoned by telephone one night to go to a certain place on a professional call. While enroute, he said, two bullets passed through his automobile. Later he received anonymous threats against his life, so he departed from Mer Rouge. It had been known that the mayor was conducting a campaign against lawlessness. Daniels and Richards were believed by some to have been implicated in the attempted assassination. A few days after that even Daniels and Richards told their friends that a crowd of men in white robes and masks took them out separately, questioned, warned, threatened, and released them. The two men later declared they recognized the voices of some of the men, whom they named. Had an Alibi They declared they could establish an alibi for the night of the attack on the mayor, as they were playing poker with nine men at the time. Richards is said to have called later on one of his questioners and informed him that if any further accusations were made against him he would hold that man personally responsible. The next night the hooded men held a meeting in a grove near the town and Daniels later told his friends he secreted himself near the place and heard what transpired and recognized many of these present. While listening to the secret con-

clave Daniels said he accidentally stepped on a stick and made a noise. A searching party located him and while under the cover of their guns he told the men he had concealed himself to obtain evidence with which to expose the men. Daniels said he was released with the warning to "keep his mouth shut." Daniels continued to talk and to name members of the hooded band, it was stated. Story of Killings On August 24, of this year, a celebration was held at Bastrop to create sentiment for the voting of a huge sum of bonds for highway construction. The Bastrop-Mer Rouge highway was lined with automobiles and other vehicles with auto-*cn* whitfi etain vehicles carrying home those who participated in the day's events, when suddenly fifty or more white robed and masked men, armed, made their appearance in automobile and on horseback, and began searching the vehicles. J. L. Daniels, 70; his son, Watt; W. C. Andrews, C. C. Davenport, and Thomas Richards were taken by the mob, bound together and placed in a trailer attached to an automobile which disappeared. Davenport was released unharmed, the aged Daniels and Andrews were blindfolded and flogged and young Daniels and Richards disappeared. The returned men declared, according to officials, that they could not identify any members of the mob. Daniels said the automobiles parked at the punishment grounds bore Arkansas and Mississippi as well as Louisiana license plates. Daniels added that his tormentors wore white robes and masks.
