



Attorneys Fees Scaled to \$25,000

Raleigh, April 3.-Adjustment of attorneys' fees in the railroad suit, effected today by Governor Morrison, leaves the state and counsel in agreement on a \$15,000 fee for Judge W. B. Bynum of Greensboro, and \$5,000 for former Governor Locke Craig of Asheville, and \$5,000 for Thomas D. Warren of New Bern.

The attorneys had submitted charges aggregating \$55,000 for their legal services in the extended litigation between the state and the Southern, Seaboard, Atlantic Coast Line and Norfolk Southern railroads over franchise, ad valorem and income tax levies.

The suits resulted in victory for the state in tax cases involving \$1,-000,000 .- Brock Barkley in Wilmington Star.
