

New Circular On Boll Weevil

Raleigh, June 12.—Bringing its recommendations right up to the present and including letters from farmers about their experiences with the boll weevil as well as the results of last year's work in dusting cotton with calcium arsenate, the Agricultural Extension Service of the State College and State Department of Agriculture has just released Extension Circular 137 by Franklin Sherman. This circular comprises 22 pages of practical and scientific information written in every-day language and easily understood. It gives the advantages and disadvantages of dusting, explains the method and describes the machinery to use.

In presenting this circular to the farmers of North Carolina, the Extension Service believes that it has fully covered most of those points that should receive attention in the control of the weevil. The circular is written from the viewpoint of the insect alone and does not combine the recommendations about livestock and other crops. Neither does it take in cultural methods, fertilization and other factors involved in producing a good crop of cotton. It only covers the "protection" of such cotton as is produced.

The circular has now been received from the printer in an edition of 15,000 and will be sent to farmers on request as long as the supply lasts. County agents will also be supplied with copies and those who do not care to write to the Editor, Extension Service, Raleigh, for a copy may obtain one from their county agent. Requests should be made as early as possible so that all preparations for fighting the weevil may be made on time.

Miss Margaret Odum is attending summer school at Maxton.

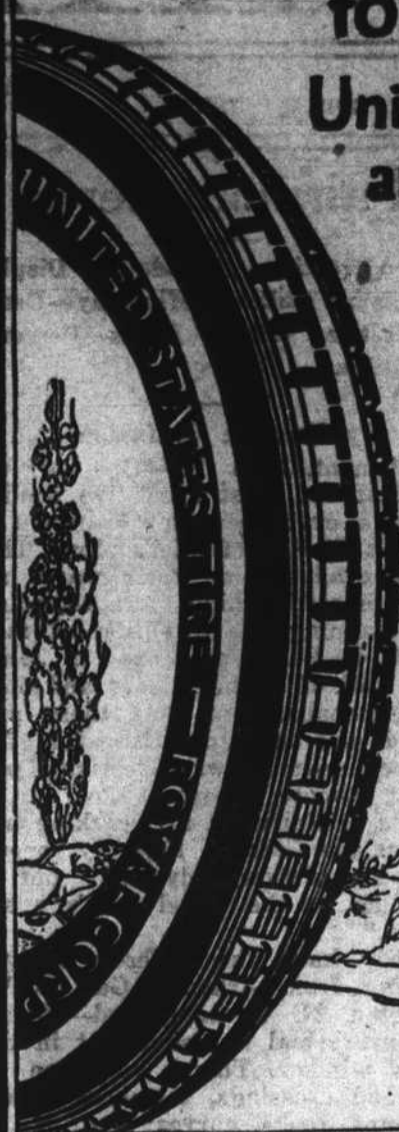

NORTH CAROLINA REPORTS THE HIGHEST BIRTH RATE

Washington, July 7.—A decline in the birth rate and a slight increase in the death rate in 1922 was shown in provisional census bureau figures for the year announced by the department of commerce.

For the 24 states reporting birth figures the rate for 1922 was 22.7 for each 1,000 of population against a rate of 24.4 for 1921. For 23 states the death rate last year was 11.9 against 11.6 for 1921.

North Carolina reported the highest birth rate, 30.2, while a rate of 18 for the state of Washington was the lowest. Death rates in the 23 states ranged from 14.7 for Maine to 8.1 for Idaho.

North Carolina's birth rate in 1921 was 33.8, while that state's death rate was 11.5 for 1922 against 11.3 for 1921.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA FEDERAL INCOME-TAX RETURNS OF INDIVIDUALS FOR 1921

The total number of Federal income-tax returns filed by individuals throughout the United States reporting incomes for the calendar year ended December 31, 1921, was 3,662,176. The net income amounted to \$19,577,212,528 and the tax (normal tax and surtax) was \$719,387,106.

For the State of North Carolina the number of returns was 44,161 which reported a net income amounting to \$127,992,951 and tax (normal and surtax) \$3,760,499.

As compared with 1920, the figures

for the United States show a falling off of 597,768 or 8.23 per cent in the number of returns filed, as well as a reduction in the total income reported amounting to \$4,158,416,655 or 17.52 per cent and a decrease in the tax of \$355,666,580 or 33.08 per cent.

For the State of North Carolina the falling off in the number of returns was 3,181 or 6.72 per cent, the reduction in the total net income amounted to \$35,806,886 or 21.86 per

cent and the decrease in the tax (normal and surtax) was \$5,860,176 or 60.91 per cent.

Berlin, June 7. (Associated Press) Germany's amandatory reparations note which was handed to the entente and United States governments this afternoon proposes a system of annuities estimated to total 1,200,000,000 marks annually if an international loan is not available for immediate capital payments.
