**In Honor of Late Woodberry Lennon**

Memorial Exercises held in Court Room—Virtues of Former Loved Member of County Bar Set Forth and Extolled in Number of Addresses.

Appropriate memorial exercises were held in the courthouse at 2:30 p. m. Monday in honor of the late Woodberry Lennon, who was for a number of years a member of the Lumberton bar. A committee composed of J. Dickson McLean, T. L. Johnson and R. C. Lawrence had been appointed to draft resolutions. These resolutions were unanimously adopted and ordered spread on the minutes of the court as a permanent memorial to Mr. Lennon and his honor Judge W. A. Sinclair ordered that a special page be set apart on the permanent records in the clerk's office in which to record these minutes as an appropriate reference to the exercise.

In addition to the reading and adopting of the resolutions, short addresses were made by Messrs. S. McIntyre, W. H. Kinlaw, J. D. Proctor, L. R. Varner, T. L. Johnson, A. W. McLean, C. B. Skipper, J. P. Russell, Henry A. McKinnon, H. E. Stacy, A. P. Spell, T. A. McNeill, F. Ertle Carlyle, J. E. Carpenter, E. J. Britt, J. J. Goodwin.

All the gentlemen who delivered addresses referred to the deceased in the highest terms, and particularly emphasized his lovable personal character, his high ideals as a lawyer, his activities in the First Baptist church and Sunday school, and his general usefulness as a citizen of the town of Lumberton and the county of Robeson. At the conclusion of the remarks by the several gentlemen mentioned above, all of them attorneys and members of the county bar except Mr. Russell, Judge Sinclair recalled having first met Mr. Lennon about 1907, when he was prosecuting the criminal docket in this district as solicitor, and stated that through all the years since that date he had known Mr. Lennon intimately and held him in the highest esteem.

**Red Cross Asks for \$5,000,000 Relief Fund**

Washington, Sept. 4.—As the federal government continued its effort to provide prompt and effective aid to earthquake sufferers in Japan and endeavored to obtain information as to the whereabouts and condition of Americans in the zone of disaster, American Red Cross officials decided today to conduct an immediate campaign for a \$5,000,000 relief fund. Contributions already are being received at headquarters here.
