Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 21. (Associated Press.)—"Guilty of murder, with recommendation for mercy" was the verdict returned tonight against Philip E. Fox, Ku Klux Klan editor, who killed William S. Coburn, a Klan attorney, in Atlanta, on November 5. The verdict under Georgia laws provided a life imprisonment, sentence. After hearing evidence and arguments for more than a week, the jury received the case late last night. You shall spend the balance of your natural life in the penitentiary of this state," the judge said. Philip E. Fox, Ku Klux Klan editor, killed William S. Coburn, a Klan attorney in latter's office here on November 5. The slayer was arrested as he fled from the office. An indictment charging murder was returned against Fox a few days later and on December 12 he was placed on trial in Fulton Superior court. From the beginning of the trial attorneys for Fox based their fight for his life on testimony that he was insane.

PLAN "TO RAISE RED FLAG OVER WHITE HOUSE." Soviet Instructions From Russia to Workers' Party Outline Plans for Revolution. Washington, Dec. 19—Intercepted soviet instructions from Russia to the Workers' Party of America, outlining detailed plans for a proletarian revolution in America to "raise the red flag over the White House," were made public today by the state department in support of Secretary Hughes' refusal yesterday to enter into any negotiations with soviet Russia. The department's announcement said that the department of justice "has assured the state department of the authenticity of these instructions." Part of the program outlined provided for the organization among industrial workers in the United States of "fighting" units. "The members of the fighting units in addition to all other matters," the instructions said, "must once a week be given instructions in shooting and receive some instructions in pioneer work (sapper work)."
