**Receipts of Automobile Department.**

The automobile department has already collected during the present fiscal year and turned over to the state treasurer \$4,062,837.86 and indicated collections in that department for the entire fiscal year, ending June 30, will approximate \$10,000,000, Secretary of State W. N. Everett told Representative Bowd, author of the \$35,000,000 road bond bill, Thursday.

**AGED CONFEDERATE VETERAN DIES AT CERRO GORDO**

Stephen Brown Passes—Interment in Meares cemetery near Fair Bluff.

Correspondence of The Robesonian. Cerro Gordo, Jan. 29.—Columbus and Robeson counties are fast losing the Confederate veterans. The latest to go to his eternal home in Columbus was Stephen Brown, on last Wednesday. Mr. Brown was more than 86 years old. He was a native of South Carolina, but when his health failed some eight or ten years ago he came to Cerro Gordo and since had made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Gertrude Stone, near town. His death is attributed to the infirmities of age. He had been quite feeble for some time and his demise came as no surprise to those who knew his condition.

Burial was made in the Meares cemetery near Fair Bluff on Thursday afternoon by the side of a brother, Hugh Brown, who preceded him to the grave four or five years ago.

Deceased is survived by one brother, West Brown, of Cerro Gordo, one son, Frank Brown, of Marion, S. C., and two daughters, Mrs. Stone and Miss Mary Brown, of Cerro Gordo.

Mr. Brown was a quiet and unassuming man, and was counted as a good neighbor and citizen.

**COMPLETE ERECTION OF WILSON SARCOPHAGUS IN WASHINGTON CATHEDRAL**

Washington.—The work of setting in place the sarcophagus, erected for Woodrow Wilson in the Bethlehem Chapel of the Washington Cathedral was brought to completion last week.

Recessed in the south wall of the chapel in a space eight feet wide and eighteen feet high, the sarcophagus preposes under massive arches, with a leaded glass interior window forming the background. A grill, canopy and flags completed the arrangement. The sarcophagus itself, of a warm cream color limestone with almost a golden gleam, bears a single decoration—the crusader's cross. In front of the cross is inscribed "Woodrow Wilson" and the date of his birth and death—1856 and 1914.
