KING'S GIFT TO F. M. C. ARRIVES

Student Body Agor over Foundation Stone From Scotland—Covered With Scotch Plaid and Draped With Flags of Britain and America.

Red Springs, Jan. 31.—The student body of Flora Macdonald college is pretty much "agor" over a stone a foot thick, about 2 feet tall and 2 feet broad that Dr. Vardell has placed on the floor in the main entrance of the college. It has been placed on a log of wood with Scotch plaid, and on the sides of the stone drape the flags of Great Britain and America. It is not very large, but it happens to be a link between two of the greatest nations in the world—England and the United States. No other person than the present King of England is the donor of this stone. It was given through the Stewart society to be used as a foundation stone for a very unique sort of chapel to be erected on the campus of the college. The gift known as Stewart chapel. The gift was made at the behest of the duke of Atholl, after he had been requested to take the matter up with the King by Cameron of Lochiel, who visited Flora Macdonald college on October 15, 1923 and spoke to the Scottish society of America.

The granite for a time was in display in a window of the Wammaker store in Philadelphia—a beautiful chiseled stone from Balmoral castle in Scotland, an indirect gift of George V. Upon the stone is carved the royal coat of arms and opposite is that of the Stewart class. Beneath is inscribed: "This tablet of granite from Balmoral was gifted by His Majesty King Edward V to the Stewart Society for presentation to the Flora Macdonald college, in memory of a Scottish heroine, as another link between Britain and America. 1745-1925."
