Robert Lumpkin and Booker T. Williams, negroes, on trial here charged with first degree murder growing out of the killing December 26 last of Chief-of-Police Boyd Rogers of Rowland, have little chance to escape the electric chair. At least this is the opinion of those who have followed the case closely and heard the testimonies of the two defendants.
