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Last Rites For Emory D. McNeill

Funeral at Home and Interment in Hollywood Cemetery—Many Old Acquaintances There to Pay Last Tribute to His Memory and Floral Offerings Beautiful.

DECEASED WAS A MAN OF SPLENDID FINANCIAL ABILITY

Funeral services for Mr. Emory D. McNeill were conducted at his home on the Carthage road Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Dr. C. H. Durham, pastor of the First Baptist church, and the body was then taken to Hollywood cemetery on route 20, East Lumberton, where it was interred in the presence of a large number of friends and old acquaintances.

As stated in Thursday's Robesonian, Mr. McNeill's death came Thursday morning at 9:30 following a stroke of paralysis on Saturday preceding. He had been an invalid for something like 10 years, having suffered a stroke of paralysis 12 years ago from which he never fully recovered.

Dr. Durham spoke briefly of the life of Mr. McNeill when conducting the service at the home Friday afternoon, mentioning the manner in which Mr. McNeill took his afflictions, and his love for his children.

Floral offerings were bountiful and were all very beautiful. When the funeral procession started from the home to the cemetery, it required several automobiles in addition to the hearse to take the flowers.

The passing of Mr. McNeill takes from Lumberton one of its oldest citizens and one who has meant a great deal to the life of the town. At one time in his life he was interested in almost every kind of business in Lumberton.

Mrs. Glenn was 72 years of age and had resided in Winston-Salem since 1891, with the exception of the time she lived at Raleigh while her husband was governor.

For many years until forced to retire because of ill health, Mrs. Glenn had been active in church work. She

was a member of the First Presbyterian church. She also was a leader in social service work in this city and section.

Mrs. Glenn is survived by one son, Chalmers L. Glenn, of Winston-Salem; one daughter, Mrs. D. E. Huffman, of Mount Airy; and one brother, T. O. Deaderick, of Weaverville.
