R. F. D. Carriers From Here Will Not Leave Until 11 A. M. Now

Change in Hour of Departure from 9:30 Until 11 Will Allow Carriers to Distribute Mail Coming in on Morning Train,

Beginning Friday, July 1, R. F. D. carriers from Lumperton will not leave the Lumberton postoffice until 11 a. m. instead of 9:50 as has been the case in the past, according to Postmaster W. H. Kinlaw.

This change means that the carriers will be held at Lumberton until of an hour. He said that the crew the mail from Seapoard train No. 14 from Hamlet can be received in the office and distributed to the carriers, receive their mail one day earlier wich time, 11:14 Eastern daylight than they have heretofore been recausing the patrons on the routes to ceiving it, Mr. Kinlaw says.

As train No. 14 from Hamlet to Wilmington brings the main mail of the day, which has heretofore been left in the postoffice until the following day, patrons of the different routes have been calling at the office for their mail and packages rather than wait until the next day and be served by the carrier. On and after July 1, this practice will be discontinued as the carrier will be in charge of all mail and packages for his route and will deliver it at the homes in person, Mr. Kinlaw states.
