RECORD BREAKER

More than a million dollars have een paid out by the 5 Lumberton to acco warehouses this season to growers selling tobacco here. The total sum up until last night was \$1. 035,137.70, and today's sales will carry this amount well over the million mark.

The poundage for the season up until last night was 4,992,835, and today's sales, although light on account of rain, will carry the total amount of tobacco sold on the Lumberton market during the season to well ov er the 5 million mark, which exceeds previous records for any one season. This week the market has sold 1, 086,448 pounds for \$231,991.39, an average of \$21.36 per hundred pounds, including scrap.

Monday was another record-breaker on the Lumberton market when 486.046 pounds of tobacco went for the sum of \$109,243.53.
