## Tobacco Notes

### GOOD RESULTS FROM POTASH UNDER TOBACCO

Mr. D. F. Britt of Saddlecreek township, R. 2 from Lumberton, has been selling such pretty tobacco of a heavy texture on the Lumberton market until tobacco men here have questioned him about his fertilizer and found that potash was responsible for the weight.

Mr. Britt says he used 900 pounds of 8-3-3, 50 pounds of muriate of potash, 50 pounds of sulfate of potash and 20 pounds of sodium nitrate to the acre, and with his Cash variety of tobacco this year he believes he will average from 30 to 35c per pound for his crop. Other tobacco of the same variety on the floors here this week did not have the color nor the weight of Mr. Britt's because, tobacco men believe, the growers did not use potash.

Potash is recommended under tobacco by the tobacco experiment station at Oxford and by some of the leading farm papers in the South.
