The Income Tax Law Repealed. There is a serious misapprehension in the public mind at the present time in relation to the income tax. Petitions are being sent to Washington for the repeal of the law. It should be distinctly understood that the Income Tax law was repealed by limitation on the 31st day of December, 1869. The tax now being assessed is for the year 1869. After it is paid no other income tax can be collected or assessed without the enactment of an entirely new law, which is not likely to be brought about. The repeal of the old law is final and unconditional. It takes effect as soon as the tax for 1869 is paid.
