Vance and Swanson Friends.—How the State was Flundered!

An issue of the New York *Times*, now before us, contains a letter written by the correspondent of that sheet, from Stateville, under date of Oct. 22d, from which we make the following extracts, that go far to show who are implicated in defrauding the State. We omit the political portion of the letter as unnecessary now to publish.

"Gov. Vance, has, in his numerous speeches, denounced the Republican Party and its members as thieves and cowards. Within a few days I have been given a copy of a letter written by Gov. Vance, which discloses the fact that he is the intimate friend of, and interested with, one George W. Swanson, a man whom Vance, during the past two years, has pretended to despise on the score of his sordid act of Carolina, of which he was the author, and carried into his hands as President of the Western North Carolina Railroad Company."

Now, the State election was suspended on the 1st day of August, by the people, and they doves deserve their decision reversed by violence, and any attempt to that end, will but close in the discomfiture of those who engaged in it.

We ought to know that, while a Republican celebration was being held in Salisbury last Wednesday night, much disturbance of the speakers took place, instigated by persons not of their faith, which, in a manner, broke up the proceedings. But for the great performance of the Republicans present, which was urged by the speakers, doubtless serious consequences would have followed. It is surprising that such outrage should continue.

Swanson last Thursday in Salisbury, and could not but note the gloom pervading the countenance of some portion of his citizens, and most sharpest faces were by whom—Instinctively the speaker Ted H.
