

HENRY G. BRYAN, Esq. at present a representative in Congress from the Halifax district, was, on Thursday, the 2nd inst. elected Governor of this state, after six ballottings.

It appears now almost certain, that the election of President will devolve upon the house of representatives; Jackson and Adams will be, by far, the two highest returned to the house.

Who will receive the other four votes, we cannot yet divine. Let me should be suspected of favoritism, we have put down to Jackson as small a number as his opponents could reasonably ask for.

A large meeting of the merchants of Wilmington, (in this state,) was held on the 23d ult. the object of the meeting having been explained, a committee was appointed to draft a memorial to the Legislature, soliciting a repeal of the law, passed in the year 1822, imposing a licence tax on the stock in trade of merchants.

Virginia.—On Monday, the 29th ult. the Legislature of Virginia assembled in Richmond, having anticipated their usual time of meeting one week, in order to supply any vacancy that might occur in the Electoral college of that state.

South-Carolina.—As many honest individuals have been induced to lend a willing ear to the improbable tales propagated by the caucus party, relative to the Presidential election in South Carolina, we have the satisfaction to inform such persons, that the legislature of South-Carolina, (which body appoints the Electors) met on the 22d ult.; J. B. Poin was elected President of the senate, and J. B. O'Neill speaker of the house of representatives.
