THE LEGISLATURE

Of this state will convene in Raleigh on Monday, the 21st inst. A list of the members will be found in this week's paper. Of the 121 members (there being one vacancy, by the failure of the election in the town of Halifax) in the House of Commons, sixty-two are new members; and of the 52 senators, (there being one vacancy from Craven) twenty-eight are new ones.

A man by the name of Manuel Antonio, has been apprehended in Elizabeth City, in this state, and taken from thence to Newbern, where he was to have been put upon his trial, at the Superior Court for Craven county, week before last, for the murder of Wm. Johnson, of Newbern.

A match race has been made up, between *Florida*, the Virginia mare, and *Ariad*, the New York filly, to be run over the Union course, on Long Island, the 23d inst., for \$20,000 a side—twenty thousand dollars for each; four mile heats, and repeat. *Ariad* was a match race, a few weeks since, for \$10,000, (four miles, and repeat) against the Virginia horse *Lejayette*. The printer of the "Reporter," in Warrenton, in this state, very foolishly offers "to bet any five gentlemen, each one year's subscription to the Reporter," that *Phyllis* will beat *Ariad*. But unless Mr. Dunavast is blessed with a more plentiful share of the *neufus* of this world, than most of his brethren of the type, we should think it would be more prudent for him to appropriate the subscriptions of his paper to the benefit of his family, than to stake them on the issue of a horse-race!

NORTH-CAROLINA ARTILLERY.

By an order of Henry W. Ayer, Col. Comdt. of the Regiment of North Carolina Artillery, the commanding officers of the several corps and companies of Artillery in this state, are required forthwith to report their strength, equipment, and condition, to the Col. at Fayetteville—in order, we presume, that he may be enabled to make a report to the Adjutant General, against the coming session of the Legislature.

THE IRISH GIANT.

Patrick McGee, the reputed Irish Giant, of whose arrival in the United States we have before made mention, has lately been exhibiting himself in the City of New-York. He was represented on his arrival, to be eleven feet in height! But the New-Yorkers have been sorely disappointed in him; he proves to be only six feet eight inches high; many persons who have visited him, measure more than six feet. And it is said the hoax will not go down; but that Patrick McGee will speedily have to resort to some other scheme to gain his victuals, besides showing himself as a Giant.

Madame Johnson, a French lady, was to have ascended from Castle Garden, in N. York, on the 18th ult. in the same balloon in which Mr. Robertson lately made his aerial voyage. Mrs. Johnson must have more nerve than ordinary females, to ride through the ethereal expanse of Heaven, when many of the latter are frightened into the hystericks, while riding safely on terra firma.

FORCE OF PUBLIC OPINION.

The *New-York Courier*, a very well-conducted and useful weekly paper, hitherto published on Sunday mornings, has altered its time of publication to Saturday evenings. The potent power of public opinion, was the cause of this alteration: the paper was issued from 8 to 11 o'clock, on Saturday night, but distributed, and dated, on "Sunday morning." Henceforth, the paper is to be dated on Saturday evening, but issued and distributed the same as formerly. It was the example of publishing a Sunday paper, that the New-Yorkers objected to; for the morality of the thing is not changed by the new arrangement.

A late French paper says, it has been remarked, as a fact worthy of attention, that of all the powers of Europe, France is the only one who has at this moment a priest among its ministers. It adds, "we observe, and it is an observation

which grows naturally out of this fact, that our archbishops are now more powerful than our prelates, and our curia more powerful than our mayors." National Journal.

PATAYEVILLE, OCT. 30.

Cotton is coming in heavily, and sells at from 14 to 14 1/2 cts. It maintains its character for excellence of quality. The purchases are made entirely with a view to the supply of the northern manufacturers, and it is said, that when that shall have been effected, (for which two or three weeks will probably suffice,) the price will fall, unless subsequent advices from Europe give a more favorable aspect to the market, which is hardly to be expected.

It affords us real pleasure to inform our country friends, that the merchants of this town pay United States Bank Notes for all produce brought to market, and that checks on the North may be purchased at 1/2 per centum premium. This state of things, together with the inducements which the uncommonly large stocks of Goods received and receiving here hold out to country Merchants, will, we confidently hope, bring many to this market who have heretofore gone to towns out of the State, to sell their produce and lay in their stocks of Goods.

Erratum.—A typographical error occurred in the communication of "Homo," in our last paper. We give the whole sentence, corrected: "If the Medical student wishes to know the definition of the word *Physiologia*, he can examine his Medical Dictionary, and there find that this word is derived from two Greek words, signifying nature (not native, as in our last) and a discourse, the "doctrine of a natural or animated body."

A preamble and resolution in favor of Gen. Jackson as next President, has passed both branches of the Legislature of Tennessee, with but one dissenting voice: a Mr. Rensaw, made some remarks, and voted, in opposition to them; it was the form, rather than the substance, he objected to. He had his objections entered on the journals. By concurrent resolutions of both houses of the Legislature, the General was to have been received, on his arrival at Murfreesboro', in the hall of the house of representatives.

The Navy Yard, which is to be established somewhere on the Florida coast, is intended as a substitute for Thompson's Island, which, it is said, is to be abandoned, in consequence of the unhealthiness of its situation.

On the 1st day of October, \$6,187,006, of the public debt of the U. S. were paid off, it being all that remained of the six per cent. stock of the year 1812.

Died, At his seat near Milton, in this State, on the 8th ult. Col. James Saunders, in the 85th year of his age. "Of this amiable patriot, (says the Milton Gazette) it may be truly said, that he lived and died the friend of the whole human race. His heart was full of human kindness, his temper all mildness and amenity.

Col. Saunders bore a respectable part in the war of the Revolution, having held a Colonelship under Gen. Ashe when the North Carolina troops marched to repel the invasion of Georgia in 1798, and during the whole of the spirited and interesting struggle which took place in this vicinity, "in the time which tried men's souls." He was a member of the convention which formed the Constitution of the State, and afterwards served as a Representative from this County in the Legislature.

Tennessee.—Mr. Foster has submitted to the Legislature of Tennessee, now in session, an amendment to the Constitution of the U. States, touching the election of President and vice President. He avowed its object to be, to introduce a uniform mode throughout the United States of electing them; and at the same time "to refer the election of these high and responsible officers, immediately to the people, and thereby preclude all idea of fraud and combination in these elections."

The proposition was referred to a Select Committee. The Legislature are not satisfied with the rigid laws which they had previously passed on the subject of gaming. These laws inflict penalties upon all betting, whether in public or private houses, so far, as to fine even the throwing up for a glass of Whiskey (such at least we understand to have been the construction of the statute)—and it deprives the lawyer of his license, who shall be convicted of gaming under the law. We learn, that two or three such penalties have actually been inflicted. The Legislature have now a bill before them, which has been read the second time, "to prescribe the oath of office hereafter to be administered to constables." Among other specifications in the oath, is the following: "You swear that you will not so long as you shall remain in office encourage or promote any match or matches at cards, dice, billiards, or any other game of hazard or address for money or other valuable thing; and that you will

arrest all such persons as in your sight shall encourage or promote any match or matches, or play at any match or matches at cards, dice, billiards, or any other game of hazard or address for money or other valuable thing, so long as you remain in office, or help you God." To violate the obligation of this oath is to be held as a misdemeanor; and it is to be administered to all the constables at the first term of the courts after the 1st day of July next. [Comptroller.]

In the House of Representatives of the 19th Congress, there will be eighty-four new members, and in the Senate of the United States, there will be nine new members.

By Saturday's Mail.

A letter from a planter near Georgetown, N. C. states that the *Catepillar* has made dreadful havoc among the cotton crop in that neighborhood: Forty acres, out of a field of seventy, was almost entirely destroyed.

We have not heard the final result of the election in Georgia, for Governor of that State; but there can be no doubt of the success of Troup, by a majority of at least 700 votes. But it is close voting, to beat only 700, out of more than 40,000 votes.

An intelligent American writes from Spain, that it was believed there, that a civil war in the United States would inevitably grow out of the recent Presidential election, and Spain then recover her colonies. In addition, all the more loyal subjects of Ferdinand were under the impression that the Holy Alliance had directed the American people to name a king for themselves, it being time that they should be brought within the happy pale of the European system!—*Nat. Gazette.*

LATE FROM EUROPE.

English papers to the 10th Sept. have been received at New York. Cotton had fallen again, and now quoted as low as 6 1/2 a 6 1/4. The last letter, however, expresses a belief that the worst of the evils of the late speculations were over, and that a better state of business may now be expected.

The new from Greece is favorable to the patriots. The Seraskier, Redschid Pacha, has been repulsed in three assaults upon Missolonghi; his loss was estimated at 3,000 killed, wounded, and prisoners.

The expedition for Greece, under Lord Cochrane, was expected to depart in about 2 months. Two large steam boats were preparing for that purpose.

A report had reached London, that the Rumianow war had ended in the total subjugation of the empire, and capture of its monarch.
