THE FINE ARTS.  
It is a subject worthy of remark,  
that while our country has been reproached by foreigners, especially by English writers, for its want of excellence, even mediocrity, in the fine arts, as well as literature, the best painters for the last half century, as well as those of the present day, are Americans. The names of West and Alston and Trumbull are familiar to our ears, eye, &c. to English ears also, as men who would confer lustre on any country that gave them birth. The name of Leslie—we must say something about Leslie; a young man, who, in despite of the miserable trade of the hireling Gifford and his Quaterly, is about to become the boast of even Gifford himself. We do not intend to say that Gifford has derided Leslie's painting, that would have been attempting to bite a diamond; but we speak of his general vituperation of every thing American. Leslie, if we mistake not, is a native of Pennsylvania as well as West, and had as humble a beginning. He was first noticed in consequence of his characteristic drawings of Cooke, in his various parts, during his first theatrical career in Philadelphia. Leslie, a mere boy without fortune, at this time, without active friends, attended the Theatre, and in a short time produced from recollection alone, likenesses of the actors, in feature, expression and costume, so exact, that they astonished all who beheld them! So powerful was the impression made by his wonderful pencil, that some gentlemen, whose names we do not feel ourselves at liberty to mention, sent him to England, which we acknowledge to be the best school, for two of its brightest ornaments in painting are Americans, and there the once obscure Leslie is rapidly approaching to eminence in this sublime art.

FROM A LONDON PAPER.  
INTERIOR OF AFRICA.  
We have received accounts of a recent discovery in Central Africa, which will soon be laid before the public in greater detail, but of which the following outline is sufficiently curious: Major Clapperton and Captain Denham, in the course of their late expedition in that quarter of the world, arrived in the territory, and subsequently resided for some weeks in the capital of a nation, whose manners and history seem likely to occupy, to no trivial extent, the attention of the public of this country; we might safely say of the whole civilized world. This people was found to be in a state of high civilization; and, above all, the British travellers witnessed a review of seven thousand cavalry, divided into regular regiments, and all clothed in complete armour. Six thousand wore the perfect hauberk mail of the early Norman Knights; most strange by far of all, one thousand appeared in perfect Roman armour.

FROM THE MEDICAL INTELLIGENCER.  
FLANNEL.  
From a review of the different substances worn next the skin, it would appear that wool has greatly the advantage over the others. Flannel, by its gentle stimulus on the skin, has the beneficial effect of keeping the pores in a state, the most favourable to perspiration. In flannel, the discharge by perspiration proceeds uniformly; but not so in linen, when soiled with the moisture of the skin. The different effects of flannel and linen are particularly perceptible during brisk exercise. When the body is covered with the former, though perspiration be necessarily increased, the perspired matter passes off through flannel into the atmosphere or air, and the skin remains dry and warm. If the same exercise be taken in linen shirts, perspiration, as in the former case, is indeed also increased; but the perspired matter, instead of being dispersed into the atmosphere, remains upon the linen, and not only clogs the pores, but gives a disagreeable sensation.

THE BANK OF IRELAND.  
The Bank of Ireland, in Dublin, covers more than an acre and a half of ground. It is built of Portland stone, and is a much superior edifice to the Bank of England in London. It has a grand portico, on College Green, of 147 feet, with columns of the Ionic order. The doors, desks and offices, are of mahogany throughout the bank, and very neatly executed. The building is supplied with reservoirs of water, fire engines, &c. It contains an armory, with a large stand of arms, and the officers and clerks form a corps of yeomanry, ready to repel any invasion upon this grand depository of Irish wealth.

FROM THE MEDICAL INTELLIGENCER.  
GEOLOGY OF NORTH-CAROLINA.  
From a statement in the Raleigh Register, it appears that Professor Owen has communicated some interesting facts discovered during a geological tour through the eastern part of this State. Numerous banks of Oysters were found on the vicinity of Beaufort, stretching several miles in length, capable of an easy conversion into lime. Numerous fossil remains, particularly of the Mammoth, were found in digging the Clubfoot and Harlow Canal. Various and valuable banks of shell marl were discovered scattered throughout the alluvial country, along the Neuse, Tar, and Trent rivers. Silicious limestone seems to be in abundance in the vicinity of Newbern; and a series of limestone rocks occupies the bed of Neuse river, in parallel ranges, running N. E. and S. W. and in correspondence with the geological formations of other parts of the state. These discoveries will, doubtless, give a new impulse to the agricultural enterprise of the State.
