

## LATE FROM EUROPE.

NEW YORK, MAY 19.

We were last night liberally overwhelmed, and that too very unexpectedly, by very short arrivals from Europe: the Howard, Holdridge, from Havre; (17th ult.) Corse, Sprague, from London, (13th ult.) and Birmingham, Cobb, from Liverpool, (21st ult.) We have only received one regular file by the first named vessel, to the commander of which we are indebted for late French papers. Our English files are irregular, but reach to the 20th ult. The most prominent article of news is a summary

The London Times of the 17th, says "Mr. Bedford Canning has received orders to make such pressing remonstrances to the Turkish government, against their cruel war with the Greeks, that it is probable he will prevail upon them to comply; or if not, to declare immediately the independence of Greece, at least to cause a suspension of military operations until the definite negotiations could be made. It is even expected that the news of an armistice will soon reach London."

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The Colombian Minister to Great Britain had succeeded, it is said; in effecting a loan for his government, with some London Capitalists, and only waited the formal sanction from Bogota to bring it to a conclusion.

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But the Russian Cabinet, we are assured, whilst it offered to take part in the negotiations with the Porte to put an end to the sanguinary struggle of Greece, answered upon the other points—that they could not be a subject of any deliberation in common with the other powers; that the difficulties, relative to Moldavia and Wallachia, resulting from private treaties with the sublime Porte, were an affair that exclusively concerned Russia, and that she wished to terminate without entering into engagements with any one;

and lastly, that the reduction of her army and suppression of her military colonies formed a part of her system of government, which it belonged to herself alone to modify or change, as she might consider it to accord with her interests.

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
