

There is a great deal of sickness, fever and ague and bilious fever, prevailing in almost an unexampled degree throughout the vicinity of New Ark, Charleston, and nearly all the lower regions of the state of Delaware, below Wilmington. Very little rain is said to have fallen there during the summer.

The Commissioners appointed by the United States—Gen. Cass and T. L. McKenney—to negotiate with the Indians on the Mississippi, have concluded a treaty, and returned to Detroit.

John Vanderpool, was lately tried at Whiteborough, N. York, before Judge Storrs, on an indictment for grand larceny, in stealing three oxen; was convicted, and sent to the state prison for three years. His case presented a singular instance of despatch in business. On Monday he took the oxen, was apprehended on Tuesday, indicted on Wednesday, tried on Thursday, and received his sentence on Saturday.

More Indictments.—It is stated in the Black Rock Gazette that the late President of the Bank of Niagara, Sylvanus Wells, and the late Cashier, Oliver Forward, had been indicted at the Circuit Court sitting at Buffalo, for a conspiracy to defraud that bank.

Gen. Beverly Daniel, Adjutant General of this State, has been appointed a Member of the Board of Military Officers, to be organized at Washington City on the 1st of next month, pursuant to a resolution adopted at the last session of Congress, directing the Secretary of War to cause to be prepared "a complete system of Cavalry tactics and also a system of exercise and instruction of Field Artillery, including manœuvres for Light or Horse Artillery, for the use of the Militia of the United States."

It is stated in the Baltimore papers that the venerable Charles Carroll of Carrollton, the only surviving signer of the Declaration of Independence, completed his ninetieth year on Wednesday, the 20th of Sept. He is said to be in possession of excellent health; and to enjoy a cheerful and contented disposition, to which he is eminently entitled by his virtues, and the many favors which, under providence, he has been permitted to confer upon his country.

It is said to be very sickly in the Western District of Tennessee, this season; the Jackson Gazette, however, of the 9th ult. says the sickness is subsiding.

Rev. Bishop Cheverus, formerly of Boston, is mentioned as successor to the Bishoprick of Bordeaux.

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The Union (New-York) Convention, have nominated Dr. Van Cleave, unanimously, for re-election as Governor of that state, and Henry Huntington, of Onondaga county, in a large majority, for Lieutenant Governor. The National Convention meets at Berlin on Monday this month. No one knows on which side nomination will fight.

The Philadelphia Gazette is reported to inquire why Mr. Williamson, of North Carolina, the gentleman appointed to the consulship at Lagayra, does not repair to that port. The appointment was, we are informed, made four months ago; but his departure from this country has not yet been announced, though, in the present situation of affairs in Colombia, American commerce is suffering severely from the want of a recognized agent of our government.

The Philadelphia Gazette states that there is so much sickness in that part of the town plot immediately this side of Bush Hill, that, according to one statement, nurses for the sick cannot be procured in the neighborhood.

Poisoned sausages have been distributed to destroy the dogs. In one day, about one hundred were found dead.

It is now distinctly understood, that P. P. Barbour, Esq. is a candidate for the next through-the-streets of New Orleans, in the 20th congress, to represent the district of Louisiana, in this state. Mr. Taylor, the present incumbent, is to withdraw.

It is with feelings of sincere regret that we announce the death of Captain Robert Trull Spence, of the United States' Navy. This distinguished Officer, who has contributed so much to the high character which our Navy has obtained, died at his seat near Baltimore, on Tuesday morning, at 6 o'clock. It is said that Captain Spence had recently been appointed to the command of our squadron in the West-India.

An article from a German paper asserts that when the Duke of Wellington was lately in St. Petersburg, a treaty was concluded between Russia, Great Britain and Prussia, embracing all the great questions of policy between the cabinets, including the affairs of S. America and Greece, and on which a declaration of these three powers will be published immediately after the coronation of the Emperor Nicholas.

The London Price Current for August 25d says—"The improvement in commerce remains steady. The accounts from all the ports of the Continent continue favorable to the revival of trade. There is intense interest excited among the foreign merchants on account of the rapid advance in spring corn. Wheat is a fine crop; barley middling; oats very short; beans and peas a complete failure."

The London Gazette announces, that the parliament, which stood prorogued on the 24th inst. should be prorogued to the 21st November; and that his Majesty has appointed Lord F. Montague to be postmaster-general, vice the Earl of Chichester, deceased.

The London papers assert that Mr. Cooper, "the American Roccus," is to play at Drury Lane.

The fever in Dublin is making the most frightful ravages. The average number of cases entered in the fever hospital was near triple that of ordinary times.

At Lancaster 45 persons, convicted of being engaged in the late riot, have been sentenced to death.

A number of vessels were fitted out at London, and to be destined to join Lord Cochrane. Reports continued that a declaration of Manifesto would shortly be made by the European powers, relative to Greece.

A frigate of sixty guns was launched at Marsailles on the 12th of August, built for the Pacha of Egypt. [May the Greeks blow her up the first cruise she makes. Ed. Carolinian.]

The steam-boats fitted out in aid of the Greek naval warfare have been detained in the Thames; by whose interference, or on what plea, has not transpired.

The following extract from a letter, dated at Havana, 19th Sept. is published in the Charleston Courier, of the 28th.

"By the British frigate Dartmouth, we have news from Mexico to the 16th ult. and an official communication to the President of that Republic of the business done at the Congress of Panama—among others, a treaty of perpetual offensive alliance between the Republics of Chile, Guatemala, Mexico, and Colombia—a secret convention, and the resolution to place the seat of their sessions at Facubaya, a delightful village near Mexico. The secret convention is about this Island, (Cuba); I know it positively.

"Bolivar was at Panama during the Sessions of the Congress. Besides the Commissioners from the above named Republics, one on the part of England, (Mr. Dawkins) and another on that of Holland, were present. Mr. Anderson had died previously, so that the Anglo-Americans were not represented. The place was very sickly at that moment.—Mr. D. lost two of his sons, whom he had with him—he stopped here two or three days. The frigate carried to England one million of dollars, to pay the premium of the Mexican loan. A gentleman, by name Canacho, had that sum under his charge, and was accompanied by some distinguished characters.

WHITE FLINT WHEAT. In answer to an inquiry which appears in the last Western Carolinian, in relation to the White Flint Wheat ordered by the Board of Agriculture to be procured for the use of the several Agricultural Societies of this State, the Secretary states, that the order was given in due time to the Editor of the American Farmer (who had politely offered his services to the Board to execute this commission) and the Wheat, and Grass Seed which was to accompany it, have been for some time expected. About ten days ago the Secretary wrote again to Mr. Skinner, urging him immediately to cause the Seed to be shipped, if not already sent, lest it

should not be received in time to be sown this fall. The Secretary hopes shortly to be able to announce its arrival at Wilmington.—Fayette Register, 2d inst.

The Norfolk papers give us reasons to hope that the malignant disease which has excited so much alarm in the city, has given way to the precautionary measures adopted by the citizens. It is said the cases of fever at present are very few; that only three deaths, from malignant fever, occurred in the three preceding days, and that only two cases of disease had been discovered.
