Tea Party.—The Grand Jury of the eastern district of Pennsylvania, which has been sitting from the 11th October, was discharged on the 1st inst. during which time they have found nearly six hundred bills of indictment, in relation to the Tea taken from the Custom-House at Philadelphia.

A pelican was shot about four weeks ago, on Mahoning river, in Ohio, which measured six feet from the toes to the extremity of the bill, and eight and a half feet from the end of one wing to that of the other. Its bill was fifteen inches long, and its pouch capable of holding two gallons.

Banks in the United States.—There are supposed to be upwards of 400 Banking Institutions in the U. S. including the branches of the U. S. Bank. The six northern States have 173 Banks—all the other States in the Union about 227.

COMMODORE PORTER. Accounts from Havana, as late as the 18th inst., have been received at New York. They state a council had been held at Havana, at which it was resolved that the squadron should attempt to cut Commodore Porter out of the harbor of Key West.

From the Charleston Courier of the 12th inst. we learn that the schooner Sally and Polly arrived at that port the day before, from Matanzas, the Capt. of which informs, at the day before he sailed, information was received from Havana by the steam boat, that Commodore Porter had escaped with his squadron from Key West.

FRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION. The Albany (New York) Argus, proposes that a great National Convention, to be composed of republican representatives from each of the States, be called, to meet at some central point, say Philadelphia or Baltimore, for the purpose of fixing on a candidate to be supported for the next Presidency.

Capt. Hull of the U. States Navy, is nominated in the Philadelphia Democratic Press, as a suitable person for President of the United States. We have doubts of his election. Capt. Hull runs well—he does not know how.

A N Orleans paper says, that two German Jews and their families, living in Jeffersonville, Indiana, of the name of Young and Fishley, are preparing to proceed to Grand Island, on the Niagara river, to inhabit the New Jerusalem laid off there by M. M. Noah.

The present population of New Orleans is believed to exceed 50,000 souls. When the city was transferred to this government, 23 years ago, it contained but 8000 inhabitants.
