Legislature of North-Carolina.

Monday, Dec. 10.—Mr. Shober, from the committee of Propositions and Grievances...

Resolutions were adopted, making it the duty of the Comptroller to take an inventory of all the property of every description...

subject to the inspection of the members of the Legislature.

Thursday, Dec. 11.—Mr. Shober made a report, recommending the rejection of the petition of Anne Alexander...

Mr. Jones, from the committee on the Militia and Militia Laws, reported a bill to add off that part of the 2d regiment of Burke...

The bill to amend the act of 1815, making further provisions in favor of the owners of strays...

Mr. McDowell presented the memorial of David Rogers of Buncombe, praying a reimbursement of money expended...

Mr. Davidson presented the petition of Elias Simmons, Alias Dowling, Mecklenburg, praying to be divorced from her husband.

The bill for the division of Haywood county, was indefinitely postponed, 33 to 29.

Mr. Pickett, from the select joint committee appointed to investigate the accounts of the Treasury Department...

Wednesday, Dec. 12.—Mr. Pickett, from the Judiciary committee, reported a bill to amend the different acts concerning Dower.

The bill for the relief of persons who have made entries of land with entry tickets, or who have had lands surveyed by surveyors...

Mr. Pickett, from the same committee, to whom was referred the resolution relative to the expediency of giving the Supreme and County Courts exclusive jurisdiction...

Mr. Pickett, presented a bill to incorporate the North-Carolina Gold Mining Company...

The bill to add a part of the second regiment of Burke to the first regiment of said county...

Mr. Parker presented the petition of Priscilla Brusher, of Guilford, praying to be secured in such property as she may hereafter acquire.

Mr. Owen, from the committee on Internal Improvement, reported unfavorably to the petition of Green B. Palmer, of Rutherford.

The engrossed bill to establish a turnpike road in Buncombe county, was amended on motion of Mr. Montgomery...

Mr. Shober, from the committee of Propositions and Grievances, to whom was referred the resolution in favor of Thomas L. Christmas...

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Messrs. Gaston and Jones of Wilmington were added to the committee on the Judiciary.

On motion of Mr. Alexander, Resolved, That the committee appointed to investigate the business connected with the Treasury Department...

A resolution authorizing the Gov. to have the Statue of Washington placed upon a platform with wheels...

The report of the Adjutant General was referred to a select committee, composed of Messrs. Hill of Wilmington, Blount, Boykin, Bateman and Ruffin.

Mr. Newland, from the committee on Divorce and Alimony, reported the following bills, which passed their first reading: A bill to divorce Winifred Everett from her husband...

and a bill to divorce Hugh Reed from his wife.

On motion of Mr. Clayton, the committee on the Judiciary were instructed to inquire into the expediency of passing an act to subject the remainder or reversion in slaves to sale by execution or other process.

Mr. Jones, of Rowan, from the balancing committee for Solicitor General, reported that John Scott is elected.

The following bills passed their third reading, and were ordered to be engrossed: The bill to secure to Jane Wilson, of Buncombe, such property as she may acquire...

Mr. Allen of Buncombe, presented the petition of sundry citizens of the counties of Buncombe and Burke, praying that, for the better and more convenient administration of justice...

On motion of Mr. Busbee, the Judiciary committee were instructed to inquire into the expediency of increasing the tax on all gates erected on public roads.

Mr. Plummer presented the petition of Martha Beasley, of Stokes, praying to be secured in such property as she may acquire.

On motion of Mr. Neill, Resolved, That a committee be appointed to inquire into the propriety of causing to be laid before the next Legislature a report from the Trustee of each county in this State...

Mr. Newland, from the committee on Divorce and Alimony, reported unfavorably to the petitions of John Powers, Thomas Tuten, James A. Mills, Jonathan Bryan and Elizabeth Burgess.

The resolution in favor of Joseph Welch and Mark Coleman, passed its first reading, yeas 69, nays 53.

Tuesday, Dec. 11.—Mr. Allen, of Buncombe, from a select committee, reported a bill for the more convenient administration of justice within a portion of the counties of Burke and Buncombe.

On motion of Mr. Clement, the Judiciary committee were instructed to inquire into the expediency of amending the existing law relating to the notice required to be given by executors and administrators...

Mr. Alexander presented the petition of Robert Bigham, of Mecklenburg, praying to be divorced from his wife.

Mr. Mitchell presented a bill authorizing the Treasurer to pay to John Gambell, late sheriff of Ashe, the excess of taxes paid by him into the Treasury.

Wednesday, Dec. 12.—On motion of Mr. Fisher, the committee on Public Buildings were instructed to inquire into the expediency of adopting some method to obtain a supply of water convenient to the public buildings...

The Judiciary committee were instructed to inquire into the expediency of amending the act of last session to prevent fraudulent trading with slaves.

A resolution was offered, to procure a clock, of Aaron Willard's make, to place in the Commons Hall, but was rejected.

The Judiciary committee were instructed to inquire into the expediency of passing a law to prevent the education of slaves.

The bill to secure to Christiana Crittenden, of Stokes, such property as she may hereafter acquire, was ordered to be enrolled.

Mr. Moore submitted the following resolutions, which passed their first reading: Mr. Gary presented a bill to repeal all acts concerning agriculture and family domestic manufactures...

Resolved, That Joseph Ross be appointed Librarian to the State Library, with a salary of seventy-five dollars per annum.

Resolved, That the said Joseph Ross shall make out and deposit with the Secretary of State, a list, arranged in alphabetical order, of all the books now belonging to the Library...

On motion of Mr. Salmons, the committee on Internal Improvements were instructed to inquire into the expediency of revising and consolidating the different acts relative to public roads...

On motion of Mr. Ruffin, the Judiciary committee were instructed to inquire into the practicability of so altering or amending the laws now in force, as more effectually to prevent slaves from hiring their own time...

Mr. Newland presented the petition of Isaac T. Avery, of Burke, praying for the establishment of a turnpike road.

On motion of Mr. Burns, Resolved, That the Judiciary committee be instructed to inquire into the expediency of providing by law that the Clerks of each County Court in this State shall, within twenty days after such court shall have laid any county or other tax...

Mr. Plummer presented the petition of Martha Beasley, of Stokes, praying to be secured in such property as she may acquire.

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
