# New Fashionable & Cheap Town Ordinances.

HEREAS encroachments have been made from time to time, on the Public Streets of the town of Salisbury, by the erection of Fences, Piazzas, Porches, Platforms and other Buildings, by which the citizens have been incommoded; and whereas the subject was New, Fashionable, & Cheap Goods, brought before the fown Commissioners at their last meeting: It was thereupon unanimously Ordered, that all fences and other encroachments, wherever found to exist, shall be removed by the first day of Febuary next, in cases of neglect, all persons so offending will be immediately proceeded against as the law directs. It was further Ordered, that no person shall

be permitted to place any Boxes, Hhds. Barrels. Benches or other articles, by which the passages selves. of the citizens may be obstructed, in the streets or walks, under the penalty of \$2, for each and every such offence.

It was further Ordered, that the law respectipg mad dogs, passed July the 9th last, shall be repealed, and the same is hereby repealed and of no further force
