The first Annual meeting of the Davidson Co. Bible Society was held at the Court House in Lexington, on Monday the 4th inst. After the meeting had been opened with singing and prayer, the ordinary business of the society was commenced.

Mr. James Wiseman took the chair as President and the object of the meeting, together with a short account of the origin and progress of this Bible Society, was stated. After this the minutes of the last meeting were read, and the following reports were made in and read to the society: viz. 1st. The committee appointed to employ agents, reported that all the bibles that had been procured soon after the first meeting of the society had been distributed during the winter and the compensation that was allowed them was \$39 65. 2dly. The Treasurer's report was handed in from which it appeared, that the receipts of the society during the past year were \$182 86 and the expenditures \$162 78 leaving a balance on the 30th of the Treasurer of \$20 08 due to the Society. 3dly The corresponding Secretary handed in his report, which was in substance as follows:

While we are called upon to cast a retrospective view at this time, upon the events which have marked the progress of our Society during the past year, we see much cause for gratitude upon our part, for the success which has attended our humble exertions in the cause of benevolence and humanity. When we meet one year ago in this place and resolved to form a bible Society, many were ready to predict its downfall before the lapse of a few months. Yet one year has drawn to a close since we as a society have had more flattering prospects for future existence as a society than we ever have had before. When we were last together, we indulged the pleasing idea of seeing our whole county supplied with copies of the sacred volume before the arrival of our first anniversary. Could this hope have been realized it would have made our first anniversary a very joyful one; but in that case, we should have accomplished what very few institutions of the same character ever have accomplished so soon after their existence. When we first embarked in the enterprise of supplying every family in this county with a copy of the sacred volume, it was not supposed by any of us that a greater number than 500 bibles were necessary to effect this purpose. Accordingly this number was procured and distributed, but to our surprise we learned that they were not sufficient to complete half the work in our county, and that at least 700 copies more were necessary. This number was accordingly sent for and received. We did not however venture to procure the whole number upon the responsibility of the society and at our request the parent society at New York liberally furnished us with 100 of the first parcel and 500 of the last as a donation to our society. The agents who were employed during the past winter in the distribution of the bibles, were necessarily stopped in their labours by a want of more bibles; and since the arrival of the second parcel they have been prevented by other engagements from resuming the work. They are willing however to resume the work in a very short time and we can now indulge the hope of seeing the work completed before many months have elapsed.

As you may see from the Treasurer's account we have not yet paid for the bibles received. We have received from the parent society 1200 bibles valued at \$659 50 cts. Of this number we have received 400 as a donation valued at \$220 00 and 800 as a sale amounting to \$459 50 cts. One hundred dollars have been forwarded to the parent society, leaving our debt to them \$359 50 cts. And the Treasurer of our society after paying the agents for their labor in distributing the bibles, together with the freight and carriage of the bibles, has a balance in hand of \$20 08 cts. There is no need of discouragement upon our part, but there is need of much exertion: the cause is good in which we are engaged and God helps them that help themselves, as poor Richard says. We would here with pleasure notice the benevolent exertions of several ladies in our village, who collected and handed to the Treasurer a handsome sum for the assistance of the society.—This report concluded with an appeal to those present for their influence and liberality in behalf of the Society.

It was then moved, that the report just read be approved and adopted. Rev. D. Gould seconded the motion and made some appropriate remarks. He gave an account of operations of bible societies generally throughout this country and throughout this State in particular; he also shewed the importance of these institutions, and the good effects which result from them, to the country generally, to families, to the welfare of men in this world and to the salvation of mankind in the world to come, and concluded with an affectionate and earnest appeal to all, for their exertions and their liberality in behalf of the object aimed at by the society.

After that motion had been carried by a vote of the meeting, the Rev. D. P. Rosemiller made this motion: that the members of this society, in view of the importance of our undertaking and of the necessity of its speedy accomplishment, use their utmost exertions for this purpose, and that the distributors be also furnished with subscription papers, to receive donations and subscriptions upon every suitable occasion, to aid in this work.

After this motion had been seconded, Mr. R. accompanied it with some remarks, in the course of which he stated the encouragements which should induce us all to continue our labors in behalf of the work already commenced, and showed that the difficulties before us, were not such as should discourage, but rather such as should stimulate us to still greater exertions. He also answered some of the arguments which the enemies of this society had brought against it and concluded with an earnest appeal to every patriot who loved his country and his country's laws, to every philanthropist who wished for the promotion of human virtue and happiness, to every christian who longed for the welfare of mankind, and to every christian who wished for the temporal and eternal welfare of mankind, to lend a helping hand to this work, that it might be speedily and successfully accomplished.

The society then proceeded to the appointment of officers for the coming year. Mr. Jas. Wiseman having expressed a wish to resign his office as President of the society; it was resolved, that Dr. W. R. Holt be appointed President of the society, John Hogan Esq. be appointed Vice President in the place of Dr. Holt, former Vice President, and that all the other officers hold their places during the term of another year.

Fourth of July.—For the first time, we suppose, since Fayetteville has had a corporate existence, this day was not celebrated here, if we except the firing of a Federal Salute at Meridian. In other towns throughout the Union, we observe that preparations were made to notice the occasion with at least the usual parade. Fayetteville Observer.
