The exploits of Genl. FRANCIS MARION, the famous partisan warrior of S. C. form an interesting portion of the annals of the American revolution. The British troops were harassed by the irregular warfare which he kept up at the head of a few daring fellows, that they sent an officer to remonstrate with him for not coming into the open field and fighting, to use their expression, "like a gentleman and a Christian."
