GREAT PUBLIC MEETING. The friends of liberty and equal rights will be rejoiced to hear the result of the Anti-Tariff meeting held in the City of Salisbury, on Thursday last.

On Thursday, between the hours of one and two o'clock, the Court adjourned and gave up the Court House to the people, and it was filled to overflowing with the most respectable men from all parts of the county.

It will be recalled that the meeting of the 4th July last, but owing to some mistake, the impression had been left upon the minds of the people that the meeting was to take place on the Tuesday of Court.
