

GENERAL ORDERS... MILLEDGEVILLE, FEB. 17, 1857.

The Major General commanding the 6th and 7th Divisions will immediately issue orders to hold in readiness the several Regiments and Battalions within their respective commands to repel any hostile invasion of the Territory of this State. Depots of arms and ammunition central to each Division will be established in this time.

By the Commander in Chief, JOHN W. A. SANFORD, Aid de Camp. Extract from Gov. Troup's Message of December 1825. Current and therefore most correct. Now is this all what did Georgia do at its session of the legislature twelve months ago?
