He does not deny that he has in fact so borrowed money, and to the extent stated in the Report; but he asserts the right to do so; and, as the Committee deny that he has the right, this is the first issue which he seems disposed to make with them before the American People.

The following is the vote allowed to above: Resolved, That it is proved and admitted that large sums of money have been borrowed at different banks, by the Postmaster-General, in order to make up the deficiency in the means of carrying on the business of the Post-Office Department, without authority given by any law of Congress; and that, as Congress alone possesses the power to borrow money on the credit of the United States, all such contracts for loans by the Postmaster-General are illegal and void.

Upon examination, it has been found that the United States Bank, the "Monster," as the President calls it, when compared with the Post-Office Department, is no more than the mouse to the mammoth.
