MASSACHUSETTS RESOLUTIONS.

The press of the South have been grossly deceived in regard to the course of the Massachusetts Legislature on the Abelition Resolutions introduced into that body. The following is the origimal preumble and the Resolutions adopted in the three quarters per cent. House by a vote of 378 to 16, and in the Senate unanimously, viz:

Whereas, the House of Representatives of the United States, in the month of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, did adopt a resolution, whereby it was ordered that all petitions, memorials, resolutions, propositions, or papers, he to any extent whatever, to table, and that no further action whatever should be had thereon; and whereas, by the resolution aforesaid, which is adopted as a standing rule of the present House of Representatives, the potitions of a large number of the People of this Commonwealth, praying for the removal of a great moral and political evil, have been slighted and contemned; therefore,

Resolved. That the resolution above named is an ancomption of power and authority at variance with the spirit and intent of the Constitution of the United States, and injurious to the cause of freedom and free institutions; that it does violence to the inherent and inalienable rights of man; and that it toad essentially to impair those fundamental principles of natural justice and natural law which are autecedent to any written Conetitutions of government, independent of them all, and

Resolved, That our Senators and Representatives in Congress, in maintaining and advocating the full right of petition, have entitled themselves to the cordin apation of the people of this Commonwealth.

Resolved, 'That Congress, having exclusive legisla on in the District of Columbia, possesses the right to balish slavery in the said District, and that its exercise should only be restrained by a regard to the public
