Should you, on the other hand, or your successors, which I deem impossible, prove false to the doctrine and example of our ancestors, should you ever, in an evil hour, desert the hanner of Democracy, and permit the antago-nist principle to plant its baleful seeds in our soil, the course of our prosperity would be at once checked, our Union would fall into fragments, and our States sink like those of ancient and modern Europe, through a series of bloody revolutions, nto the gulf of national ruin. It is for these reasons, gentlemen, that we sus-

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tain the Democratic principles and the Democratic Administration of the General Government; that we rejeice in the successes of the Democratic par ty. We feel so pride in party triumplis, merely assuch; we have no pleasure in achieving victories over peighbers, friends and brothers.
