> Postmaster Franklin.-In 1754, Benj. Franklin was Postmaster General, with the permission to make 6,000 pounds of continental money, if he could, out of the whole Post Office Department in America. The very next year he gave the astounding notice that the mail, which had before run once a fortnight to New England, would start once a week the year round; whereby answers might be obtained to letters between Philadelphia and Boston in three weeks. In 1774, it was, announced in all the papers of the colony, that "John Perkins engages to ride post, to carry the mail once a week between Philadelphia and Bultimore, and will take along, or bring back, led horses, or any parcel." When a postrater proposed starting, notice was given of his intention by advertisement, also by the town crier, for several days in advance. In 1790, the number of post offices had increased through the country to seventy-five.
