

It is now decided in the election of Wm. H. Harrison, to fill the office of President of the United States for four years, from the 4th of March next. MAINE. Is yet doubtful, so far as our information extends. Late accounts are favorable that the Democrats have carried the State.

NEW HAMPSHIRE. This true Democratic State, has elected Mr. Page, (Dem.) Governor, and given a majority of 6,450, for the Democratic Electoral Ticket.

MASSACHUSETTS. As we expected, this old Federal State has gone for the Federal candidate by an overwhelming majority. John Davis, ("Iron-Head John.") has been elected Governor, and the Harrison ticket will lead in the State at least 15,000 votes, it is reported.

CONNECTICUT. The majority for Harrison in this State of the Hartford Convention, is over 5,000 votes.

NEW YORK. In consequence of the prevalence of Abolition influence, has gone for Harrison by about 12,000 majority.

NEW JERSEY. Is claimed by the Whigs to have given a majority of over 2,000 for the Harrison ticket.

DELAWARE. This little spot of creation has gone for the Federalists, as usual. Not having heard anything from this State, says the Globe, we conclude the Federalists have pocketed it.

PENNSYLVANIA. The old Keystone has been indeed seduced from her high virtue to the embrace of Federalism for the first time.

VIRGINIA. The glorious and unterrified old Dominion, the land of Jefferson and of Patrick Henry, has indignantly scorned the alliance of Federalism and Abolition.

FEDERAL TRANSPORTS. It is no longer since the Federal party have held the reins of power or enjoyed the opportunity of triumphing, that their present success has run them almost mad; they are absolutely wild with transports of joy at the prospect of once more getting into office.

OHIO. Has given the Harrison ticket a majority of over 25,000.

KENTUCKY. Has doubtless gone for Harrison, by a probably increased majority since the summer elections, a few returns would so indicate.

TENNESSEE. Has elected the Harrison ticket by at least 10,000 majority, so we are inclined to believe from the returns received.

GEORGIA. Official returns not received. The Federal papers claim that there will be 8,000 majority for the Harrison ticket.

MISSISSIPPI. We have but few returns; those show a Federal gain, and it will not surprise us that the Democracy have lost the State.

LOUISIANA. Reported majority for the Harrison ticket 3,000, from Federal papers.

INDIANA. Is claimed to have gone for the Federal ticket by 10,000 majority.

MISSOURI. Not fully heard from, but doubtless true to her Democratic faith.

ILLINOIS. A reported Whig gain so far as heard from, so that the Whigs set the State down as doubtful. It has been heretofore Democratic by a considerable majority, and we think will stand firm yet.

PARTIES IN CONGRESS. Federal Administration, it may not be interesting to the reader to know the state of parties in the National Legislature at present, with some conjecture of what their character will probably be in the next Congress.

Total—Democratic 24; Federal 20. \*One vacancy in Virginia. The following are the Senators whose Terms of service will expire on the 4th March next: Mr. Calhoun, S. Carolina, Mr. Crittenden, Kentucky, Mr. Brown, N. Carolina, Mr. Clayton, Delaware, Mr. Wilson, Ohio, Mr. Van Dusen, Pennsylvania, Mr. King, Alabama, Mr. Knight, Rhode Island, Mr. A. A. Rea, Oregon, Mr. Robinson, Illinois, Mr. Nicholas, Louisiana, Mr. Rogers, Maine, Mr. Walter, Mississippi, Mr. Wall, New Jersey, Mr. Fulton, Arkansas, Mr. Hubbard, N. 13 Democrats and 6 Federalists;—and Mr. Strange of North Carolina, who has resigned, and Mr. Preston of South Carolina, whose seat will doubtless be vacated, and there are 14 Democrats and 7 Federalists.

OF THE STATES TO ELECT THIS WINTER, Georgia will send a Federalist, so will Louisiana, Tennessee, Delaware, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maine, New Jersey, Kentucky, Michigan, Virginia 2, North Carolina 2.

South Carolina will elect 2 Democrats, Alabama 1, Mississippi 1, New Hampshire 1, Illinois 1, and Arkansas 1.

THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY HAVE A MAJORITY in the present House of Representatives; but late elections in Pennsylvania, Georgia, Ohio, New Jersey, Maine and other States, have so resulted as to ensure the Federalists a considerable majority in this branch of the National Legislature likewise, on the opening of the next Congress.

NORTH CAROLINA. If any of our readers are in doubt as to the political position of North Carolina at this present writing, it has become our duty in the course of human events, to assure them that they need remain in a state of uncertainty no longer.

CENSUS STATISTICS. The New York Herald gives the following particulars of the population of New York City: Whites 144,354, Females 153,630, 6,933, 0,098. Total number of whites, 297,984. Total blacks, 15,675. Grand total, 313,659.

WASHINGTON CITY CONTAINS A POPULATION OF 22,772 souls—Richmond (Va.) of 20,153. Baltimore of 191,499, being an increase of 20,655 since 1830. Charleston of 41,130. Pittsburg (Pa.) of 69,003. The population of Russia is said to be over fifty three millions. The Legislature of Georgia assembled at Milledgeville, on the 2nd inst., Thomas Sticks of Greens county, was elected President of the Senate; and Charles J. Jennings of Augusta, Speaker of the House; both Whigs.

A Resolution has been introduced into the Georgia Legislature, says the Augusta Constitutionalist, against the Sub-Treasury, and expressing a desire for its repeal, and also another, instructing the Senators and Representatives of that State in Congress to oppose the charter of a National Bank.

THE RESULT OF THE TRIAL OF PRINCE LOUIS NAPOLEON and his principal followers, for the late insurrectionary movement in France, has been a conviction, and the following sentences pronounced: Prince Louis Napoleon, perpetual imprisonment; Count Montholon, 20 years detention; Messieurs, 15; Voisin, 10; Lombard, 20; Parquin, 20; Bouffet Montauban, 5; Eggerster, 10.

GEN. DODGE, THE DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE has been elected the Delegate to Congress, from Iowa Territory. The Democratic majority in the Territorial Council is 13.

GOV. McDONALD has recommended in his message to the Legislature of Georgia, "that a day be fixed for the resumption of specie payments, allowing the Banks a reasonable time to prepare for it, and that such penalties be annexed to their refusal as will ensure their compliance."

Buffalo, New York, was visited by a heavy snow storm, on the 27th of last month. The people in that region have every prospect of a fine winter, from this start.

FOREIGN. Late advices from Europe, mention the prospect of a possible pacific adjustment, by the allied powers, of the difficulties in the East, between the Turkish Sultan and the Pacha of Egypt.

Egypt is fortified from Damietta to the Marchout, and 60,000 men are collected at Alexandria.

THE STEAM SHIP PRESIDENT which sailed from New York for Liverpool on the 2d, after proceeding some 300 miles on her passage, returned to New York, in consequence of having experienced heavy and continued gales from the N. E. which obstructed her progress, and so exhausted her supply of fuel as to render it doubtful, whether with a continuance of the gales, she had sufficient left to enable her to reach Liverpool.
