Theory of the Wand .- Wind has been explained in the following manner; Heated our has a tendency to rise, and cold air rushes in to supply its place. Thus the heated air of the equatorial regions rises and gives place to a current sent from the polar regions, which is a process that serves to equalize the temperature of the world. But the polar countries lying near the axis of the sphere, the air from those regions has not received so much motion as about the equator, or greater distance from the axis; wherefore, it arrives at the equator where the motion of the earth is greater. It it had no motion before, an east wind would be the consequence, and the force of that wind be, as the difference between the motion of the earth where the air came from, and that where it arri ved; but then it has a motion of the South; for it is rushing into a vacuom left by the air which rises; so that the wind will not be from the east, but the north east and the number of degrees north of the east from which it will blow will depend upon the comparative force of the current of air from the north to the difference between the earth's motion at the equator and at the polar region, from whence the air comes. As there must be a corresponding efflux from the equator higher up, according to this theory, the wind should every where be north. 


