ATTEMPTED ARREST OF A CRIMINAL.
HE ESCAPES, WOUNDED.—Yesterday a colored man whose name we have not learned, and who is charged with the burglary and robbery of Mr. Phillips' store and shop in this town some months since, was found by Mr. Moses Smith and posse in a house in the Eastern ward. After he was virtually in the hands of the officers, he made a sudden break for liberty, and succeeded in getting off, although several shots were fired at him as he ran, some of which appeared to take effect in his back and caused him to give signs of distress. The guns were only charged with small shot; and whilst they made the dust fly from his coat and some wound from his head, they did not prevent the fellow from getting up and dusting till his pursuers had sight of him in the woods east of town. He is certainly wounded and may be captured yet.

House of Representatives—Principal Clerk, Col. S. D. Pool, of Curran; Assistant Clerk, W. H. Hardie, of Buncombe; Doorkeeper, John H. Hill, of Randolph;—Raleigh News.
