## THE BANKRUPT LAW.

The Reversionary Interest in Homestead Lands.

We published two weeks ago, an extract from the Statesville American, in relation to the Baukrupt Act, to which we added our opinion as to the effect of the discharge in Bankruptey, upon a judgment, and the lien by virtue of it. It was in substance, that the bankruptcy would discharge the judgment debt and consequently there could be no lien under it; and that the bankrupt would take his homestead free from such encumberence. Our opinion is based upon the tuling of Judge Dick, as we understand it.

Another ruling has recently been made by Judge Dick that is of great importance. He holds that the reversionary interest in the homestead lands is exempt to the bankrupt. This is under the laws of N. C , chapter 121, Acts of 1869-'70.

The exemptions in bankruptcy in N. Carolina, will therefore stand as follows:

A homestead and the dwelling and buildings used thereon, not exceeding in value the sum of \$1,000. The reversionary interest in the home-

to between \$2000, and \$2500.

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
