NEWSPAPER LAWS. We receive so many inquires as to the laws governing the circulation of newspapers, that we find it necessary to publish the following summary, which will cover all the questions

that have been addressed to us : 1. Subscribers are considered wishing to continue their subscription. 2. If subscribers ordering the discontinance of their periodicals may continue to send

them until all arrearages are paid. 3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible till they have settled their bill, and ordered them discontinued.

4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publishers, and the papers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsibl . 5. The courts have decided that refusing

to take papers from the office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facil evidence of intentional fraud.

6. Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered reps. it or not, is held in law, to be a subscriber. Ca and must pay for it.
