NOTICE.—After the 30th of June, 1873, the new Post Office law goes into effect, requiring editors to pay postage on all their exchanges. We would endeavor to explain the objects of the proposed meeting, but prefer the farmers to come and decide upon the merits of the measure after they have heard its chief exponent.

MERONEY'S HALL.—We are glad to learn that Mr. T. J. Meroney is engaged in repairing and fitting up his large Hall, recently purchased from the town, in regular theatrical style, to be used as a place of amusement for any other purpose the public may demand. It is a large magnificent Hall and we hope it may prove remunerative to our enterprising townsman.

THAT REPORT.—There are many citizens anxious to see a full report of the receipts and disbursements as made by the Treasurer of the Town last year. It is the duty of each Board of Commissioners, made so by law, to have made out and published, in some form, a full statement of the annual receipts and disbursements of the citizens' money. We, therefore, call for this statement. According to our understanding, it was ordered to be published by the last Board. Why it has been delayed, we do not know. There is one thing seems to us clear, that is, the succeeding Board had no right to detain it or interfere with it in any way other than to carry into execution the order of the previous Board with regard to it. We do not charge, for we do not know, that this has been done, but it is a little strange that it has not been given to the public. The law requires its publication, and we intend to see that it is complied with or expose whoever stands in the way.

CLEANING UP.—We notice that our exchanges of other towns and cities are urging the adoption of sanitary measures, and that in many places the municipal authorities, are very active in cleaning up and putting in order their respective localities. We, too, would urge it upon our authorities, did we think it would do any good, but we have so often tried this method and failed that we decline to suggest even the importance of sanitary measures. We are all convinced that now, above all others, is the season for cleaning the streets, for removing the accumulated filth of the winter from the ditches, for filling up holes and insuring an efficient system of drainage, to say nothing of repairing sidewalks, pavements, &c., and yet, if there is any thing doing having the execution of these important measures in view, it is not generally known to the public. The mayor we believe will do his duty if properly sustained by the Board, and we think a majority of the Board are sufficiently progressive and energetic to execute whatever in their judgment may seem best for the interest of the town. If there are fogies disposed to oppose them they should be left by the way side. This we believe will be done; for in short, it is just what the citizens demand. The time has passed for taxpayers to tamely submit to whatever their inefficient public managers see proper to give them. They pay their money and they will take their choice, as to what they will accept. If the streets are not properly repaired and every nuisance removed within a reasonable time, every citizen on whose premises such necessary repair is neglected or such nuisance exists should proceed without delay to indict the Board of Commissioners, and if possible, they should be individually responsible for neglect of duty. No man has a moral right to accept a position whose duties he has not the time or the inclination to discharge.

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THE CITIZENS PAY OVER \$4,000 ANNUALLY. A sum amply sufficient to keep the streets in the best of repair, pay the interest on our debt and leave a handsome surplus left. Yet the whole amount is annually expended, the streets remaining in a dilapidated condition and the interest on the debt unpaid, how sad for what no one doubts. This state of things should cease, and it is not only the privilege, but the duty of the citizens to hold their public servants to a strict account for willful negligence. Let every good citizen aid the Board in the discharge of its duties and in the enforcement of the laws and ordinances of the town; but let them see to it that the laws and ordinances are enforced; that sanitary regulations are observed, and that the streets are kept in order.

United States Internal Revenue.

Notice to Special Tax Payers THE LAW of December 24, 1872 requires every person engaged in any business availing of employment, which renders him liable to a SPECIAL TAX, to procure and place conspicuously in his establishment or place of business. A STAMP, denoting the payment of said Special Tax before commencing business. The taxes embraced within the provisions of law are quoted as follows, viz: Reciters, 2500 00 Dealers, retail liquor, 25 00 Dealers, wholesale liquor, 100 00 Dealers malt liquors, wholesale, 50 00 Dealers in malt liquors, retail, 25 00 Dealers in leaf tobacco, 500 00 Retail dealers in leaf tobacco, 25 00 and on sales of over \$1,000, fifty cents for every excess of \$1,000.
