THE PICNIC.—Came off last Friday according to appointment. There was not so large a turnout as was expected a but still a goodly number considering the circumstances. We have heard the speeches spoken of in very high terms, especially, that of Dr. Payne.

PERSONAL.—We had the pleasure of meeting in our office a few days ago Prof. S. Taylor Martin, the accomplished principal of the Simonton Female College at Statesville, N. C. Hon. W. M. Robbins was also in our sanctum on Tuesday evening last. He was looking well, and was as usual pleasant and hopeful.

OUR MAYOR.—We are glad to know that our Mayor is now also a magis rate, indeed, he was not clothed with the powers of one before. Mr. C. S. Mooring resigned the position as Magistrate, and Dr. Keen has been appointed instead. There can now be no doubt about the Mayor's authority to enforce the laws and ordinances of the city, and we believe he will do it impartially, fearlessly, and well.

SALISBURY HOUSE.—Mrs. TROY, formerly of Company Shops, now in charge of the Salisbury House, here, is quietly working her way to public notice and favor. Her House is orderly, and well managed in all respects as concerns the comfort of guests; and with her superior knowledge and experience to guide, bids fair to become a favorite place for wayfarers and others visiting Salisbury. The location of this House affords guests a commanding view of nearly all the business parts of Town, and ready access to all the principal business Houses.

THAT REPORT.—We have been requested again to call for the Town Treasurer's report. There are quite a majority of our tax-payers who desire to see the amount of receipts and an itemized statement of disbursements. They desire to know what that magnificent structure misnamed the public well cost; what the police cost, how much of the public debt was paid and to whom; how much work was done on the streets, &c., &c.

We do not know who is to blame for withholding this report. It should have been made public 20 days before the last election; but by courtesy it was permitted to lie over. Somebody is liable to indictment for not complying with the law in this matter.

A TERRIBLE STRUGGLE WITH A DOG.—Last Friday night as Mr. J. F. Moore was quietly passing along Innis street home, and just in front of Mr. B. F. Fralley's residence, he was suddenly attacked by a large bull dog, the property of Mr. Fralley. Mr. Moore had a small cane in his hand at the time with which he struck the dog when it flew from him leaving him without any weapon of defence. The dog reared up as if trying to get Mr. Moore by the throat. Mr. Moore seized the dog and succeeded in getting his arm around the animal's neck and they fell to the ground together. They rolled over each other several times. Mr. Moore still holding with a death grip around the neck, and finally conquered the animal by choking him in this way before assistance came to his relief. The dog inflicted two painful bites in Mr. Moore's right arm. Considering the size, strength, and viciousness of the dog, Mr. Moore's escape with no more serious injuries is almost miraculous. The terrible fight lasted nearly three minutes, and Mr. Moore, though quite a stout and courageous man, was thoroughly exhausted.

SCHEMER is upon us, and it behooves our efficient health officers to use extra diligence and energy in having every portion of the city thoroughly cleansed. We already notice that from the week ending April 13th to May 20th there were 74 cases of sporadic cholera in New Orleans, and about 80 cases of cholera morbus and cholera infantum. The papers of that city attribute the appearance of these diseases to the want of proper sanitary precautions. An ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure.

Now, we do not publish the above for the purpose of suggesting to our municipal authorities the propriety of inaugurating sanitary measures; for this might be regarded as dictation; but we wish to let our citizens know what other places are doing for the health of their inhabitants, and what they propose to do.

We think it quite probable that our municipal authorities will yet do something toward cleansing up the filthy localities of the town, though there has been nothing done in this way within the last twelve or eighteen months.

The fund thus raised is a corruption fund, but most of it goes to the political "dead beats" and hungry voters who hang round committee rooms day and night, boasting of their influence, and who are not qualified for the office, stand with such a custom blocking up his pathway. He cannot pay the assessment, and cannot therefore move a peg.
