The actual weight of the collar is less than two ounces.

WHEAT CULTURE. - The grain market in the Atlantic and Gulf States increases rapidly with the growth of wealth and population, for a man's needs increase with his means. The ability of the State of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois to produce a surplus becomes constantly less. In a few years they will be purely consumers. and have a deficiency like New England and the middle States. The area of wheat culture pushes steadily west-ward, while it makes no progress at all in the Atlantic States, and is more likely to recede than otherwise. The trouble in transportation that has given rise to the farmers' com' ibination arises wholly from this movement westward. The producer and the con sumer are getting further and turther apart. The area of production will soon reach such a remote point that wheat will not bear foreign export, and will be only available for domestic consumption. We presume that the result will be a reaction in favor of extended and improved wheat culture in the Atlantic States .- Phila North American. .
