TRIPLE ACCIDENT.—Whether it was much to learn that a serious accident occurred to Captain George Morrison, Conductor on the Carolina Central Railroad, yesterday evening. It appears that he was on a hand car coming to Rockingham from Wadesboro, when, arriving at a point just beyond Poplar Bridge, the hand car run into a flat car standing on the track. Captain Morrison, who was sitting on the front of the hand car at the time of the collision, had both legs broken. We could hear nothing as to his condition except that one leg was very badly crushed. He was attended by Mrs. Stafford and C. C. King.

The announcement of this accident will cause a thrill of sadness among the numerous friends of Capt. Morrison in this city.—Wilmington Star.

In alluding to the Kelsey murder and mystery, the New York Herald of the 25th inst., says: "We are glad to notice that Governor Dix has taken some preliminary steps looking to an official State investigation into matters connected with the barbarous and alleged subsequent murder of Charles G. Kelsey, at Huntington, L. I. It would perhaps, have been better had the proper legal officer of the State (the Attorney General) taken the initiative in the special examination. The case was given to the Coroner's jury last evening, but up to a late hour the verdict had not been rendered. The evidence given yesterday presented the usual features of this depressing affair, namely, testimony offered on one side and flatly contradicted on the other, involving perjury at least on one side. The California skeleton of a living Kelsey having been abandoned, the idea of a "political conspiracy" is in vogue for the defence of the suspected parties."
