The Charlotte Observer suggests, that we write something about our town pumps. Good suggestion, neighbor. We'll do it. Here goes: Our Town Pumps, or rather, Our City Water Works, being situated in public square, on an elevated site, can be made serviceable many ways in addition to supplying the city with water; and it is thought that an ice manufactory can be run in connection with the Water Works to great advantage. Our people are not yet skilled in the manufacture of ice and such things, but having resolved to adopt the receipt of Mr. C. F. Harris, of the Concord Sun, we are confident that they will be enabled to furnish ice to all comers in limited quantities by the commencement of the next Fall of the Carolinas.

Chain-Gangs.—The County Commissioners of Brunswick county have passed an order to place all their convicts, whether from judges' or magistrates' courts in a chain-gang and make them work out their terms of imprisonment or amount of costs, when not paid, on the public roads, under the charge of a competent overseer. Those convicted at the last term of the Superior Court will be placed on the road from Brunswick Ferry to the South Carolina line. The Commissioners think this plan will prove more beneficial to the county than paying jail fees or placing them in the work house.—*Wilmington Star.*

The Commissioners of Brunswick are sensible men, and their example might be followed by those of other counties, to great advantage. We therefore recommend the action of the Commissioners of Brunswick to those of this and other counties. It would be better for the tax-payers and better for the prisoners to adopt this way of dealing with convicts.

OUR SUPERIOR COURT is in session, His Honor Judge Cloud presiding with his usual ability and dignity. Business, progressing as rapidly as could be expected under the circumstances. The courts in this district are somewhat different from those of others: One man does pretty much all the business, and our Lawyers, Jurors, Sheriffs, and Clerks are happy. There now! It only remains, however, in name to dispense with these various officers as well as in fact, and thereby, save the fees. Since one man assumes to perform the duties of all, receiving therefor a stipulated salary, it will be a great saving to the people in the long run, notwithstanding business is greatly complicated and delayed. We notice several lawyers from other points in addition to the bar of this place in attendance on our court, but of course they will not get a chance to put in a word for their clients. There are two capital cases to be tried at this court, neither of which has commenced yet.

At a meeting of the citizens of the town of Salisbury held at Meroney's Hall, 13th April. On motion Mr. J. J. Bruner was made chairman, on taking the chair Mr. B. explained the object of the meeting to be for the benefit of the town.

On motion W. H. Overman and J. A. Hedrick were made secretaries. Dr. Keen addressed the meeting in an interesting speech in relation to the discrimination made by railroads in tariffs to this place.

Mr. Davis moved that a committee of seven (7) be appointed to memorialize the President and Stockholders of the N. C. Road who will meet here on Thursday next to lower the freight to this place, the motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. A. H. Boyden moved that the chairman appoint the committee, the motion was carried and the following gentlemen were appointed: G. A. Bingham, W. H. Overman, Capt. Thos. Beall, J. D. McNeely, P. N. Heilig, Jehu Foster and T. F. Klutz.

Mr. E. B. Marsh addressed the meeting in regard to encouraging mechanics and Manufacturing.

On motion of Mr. M. L. Holmes the meeting adjourned.

VICTIMS TO ROPE JUMPING.—Katie Martin whose parents reside at Newark, N. J., went to be very much exhausted, after jumping a rope three hundred times in succession, and the next morning was found dead in bed.

A similar fatal accident, the result of exhaustion from the playful exercise of jumping rope, occurred Friday in South Washington, the victim being a girl nine years of age, named Mary A. Shugrue. She had, with some companions, been indulging in the sport above named, and in her ambition to excel the rest, fell to the sidewalk, congestion of the brain setting in.

All the depreciation of the currency has been brought about by the government in the interest of the bondholders by repudiating its own debts and by refusing to take legal tenders in payment of custom duties, while it forced its citizens to take the legal tenders in payment of private debts. It was the duty of the government to manage its own currency and see that it kept good, uniform and of equal value everywhere. The people of the East had wealth, income, bonds and Congress had a right to tax them all. He hoped to see the day when the wealth of the country, and not its poverty, would bear the burden of taxation.

The Hygeia Hotel, at Fort Monroe, which cost originally sixty thousand dollars, has been sold at auction for twenty-seven thousand.

Prince Bismarck lately informed Herz Von Johann the eminent Hungarian poet and statesman, that he (Bismarck) is a "Protestant of the strict Calvinist persuasion."

Judge R. P. Buxton, "at the solicitation of friends of both political parties," announces himself as a candidate for reelection to the office of Judge of the 5th Judicial district.

Marcellus B. Stearns, who became Governor of Florida, by the death of Governor Hart, is a native of Maine, and left College during the war to go South as a private in a regiment from his State.

Mr. J. T. Clarke, the richest man in Australia, died last January, aged seventy-three years. He owned one hundred thousand acres of land, and was worth between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000.

Washington correspondents intimate that Congress will not be able to go through with its business so as to adjourn before the middle of July. There are nine appropriation bills yet to be considered.
