The S. C. Clerkship.

It is becoming a matter of peculiar interest to many of our citizens as to who shall be our next Clerk. CHANGED HANDS.

The new company is said to be composed of large capitalists who will at once greatly increase the appliances for getting out the gold, by putting up the latest and most improved machinery. All we lack is capital to develop them.

That Report.

As soon as we get time, we will go to the Court House and endeavor to gather from the Town Treasurer's report, posted up there, the facts with respect to the receipts and disbursements of the municipal government for the last year. If what we hear is true, the town debt was reduced very little last year, and very little, if any, the year before, as we know, notwithstanding town property amounting to more than four thousand dollars has been sold, and the annual taxes amount to nearly five thousand dollars. We happen to know something about the town's finances, indebtedness, &c., &c. Our connection with the committee appointed two years ago to ascertain the indebtedness of the town, and as Clerk of the Board for two years, enabled us to post our self pretty thoroughly. We know what it requires to run the town government, and about what the annual revenue is. So we have not been talking about this matter unadvised.

WAKE FOREST COLLEGE.

We are indebted to the marshals for an invitation to attend the commencement exercises of this institution, which takes place on the 23, 24, and 25 of this month.

We were pleased to receive a call on yesterday, from the Rev. J. B. Lareus, who is well known to our citizens. Mr. L. has been engaged for several months as an editor at Richmond, Va., and fills the place ably and well.

In our last issue we published a card from our friend T. G. Haughton, C. B. C., in which he took the ground that we were in error in saying that he, as clerk, was required to make out an annual statement of the receipts and disbursements of the town funds, &c. We certainly intended no reflection on Mr. Haughton; but we felt sure he was laboring under a misapprehension as to his duty in the matter referred to. He quotes the law to show that he is right, and we quote it again to show that he is wrong. The law bearing on the subject is clear and unmistakable we think. Here it is:

Section 12, of the original charter, referring to the accounts to be kept by the Town Treasurer, receipts and disbursements of all the public funds, says: "The Commissioners shall cause a copy of said account for the year preceding every first day of December to be made by their clerk and posted in the Court-house in said town for twenty days next previous to the first day of January in each and every year; and for the breach of their respective duties assigned them in this section, the said commissioners, clerk and town treasurer shall be liable to indictment."

This section sets forth the duties of the town treasurer, with respect to the money received by him and paid out on the order of the town clerk. The commissioners then are required to cause
