Our Boys. - We do all the work on our paper with boys. Since we have no Ring backing, nor government support, we employ boys for two reasons: We can not afford to pay the unressonable wages too often demanded by purneymen printers, and then we are ble to render some assistance to deserving mothers by giving employment to willing and devoted sous. The disadvantages and annoyance to be encountered by the employment of inexperienced labor exclusively, must be apparent to all, but we patiently submit to these for the reasons given above, and feel thankfull

that we are able to get along so well. Our boys are all quite young and all popular writers, both home and abroad. have widowed mothers, and they are struggling honestly and faithfully, as al could help them more. They have had little or no educational advantages other than those of the printing office, yet we hazzard nothing in saying that they are as well, if not better, informed on all public matters as any boys of their age in the town; their store of general information is better, they can spell better, arrange words into sentences with more ease and beauty, understand their duties as boys to their mothers and as citizens more folly, and devote themselves to these duties with a better grace and a higher appreciation of their responsibilities than the large majority of boys. We hope and believe they all belong to that class of boys who will grow up to be good and useful citizens, and who will, by industry, application, and strict integrity, demonstrate to the world the truth of Pope's justly celebrated lines :
