An Earth Quake at Sea.

The ship Hamlin of Boston arrived at this port early yesterday, with a cargo of sugar from Manilla. Her commander. Captain Russ, states that at 3 a m. on June 3, when in latitude 10 degrees 76 minutes, longitude 57 degrees 51 minutes, all on board felt the shock of an earthquake which lasted fully ten minutes. During this time there was a heavy sea running, and in different places the water appeared to revolve in circles like a whirlpool. When the disturbance first began the rea was quite smooth, but as the shock increased in violence the waters became correspondingly agitated, terrifying those who were on deck, and arousing those who were sleeping below. Suddenly the vessel received a shock as if she had grounded and a peculiar rumbling poise filling the air simultaneously with the shaking, the eky assumed a dull, leaden hue. The atmostphere was also thick School Committee, D. M. Barrier, Mearoe and hazy. During the continuance of the shock, control of the vessel was completely lost, and the ship refused to obey the helm. There was little, if any, wind at the time, yet the vessel was tossed about as though in the midst of a gale.

The Captain describes the upheaving of the waves as similar to what would occur if a series of submarine explosions had taken place. The duration of the shock was long enough to enable those below to reach the deck and witness the unusual sight. After the disturbance had subsided, the sea again became as calm as before. The vessel sustained no damage and the cargo appears to be in tact, although her 5,000 boxes of sugar was thrown about by the shock, - N. Y. Tri-
